# RAMMING OF SUB BY LINER CAUSES LOSS OF 34 LIVES

Newport, R. I., Sept. 26.—A message received from the destroyed Putnam late this morning said that no trace of the submarine S-51 had been found. The Putnam was searching east of the spot where she is supposed to have gone down and the sub-

marine S-1 was searching west. New York, Sept. 26.—Thirty-four officers and men of the United States submarine S-51 apparently perished last night when the coastwise steamer City of Rome rammed and sank the submersible 14 miles east of Block Island, R. 

Head of Turkish Delegation at Geneva Issues Virtual Ultimatum.
