An alarming scarcity of hard coal will be felt in London in less than two weeks if miners in the anthracite fields of Pennsylvania continue on strike. An additional two weeks would see the city in the throes of a would see the city in the throes of a virtual fuel famine.

Although the full effect of the anthracite shortage has not yet devel oped critically, the situation is sufficiently acute to make it apparent that Londoners are due for a change in the manner of heating their houses. W. A. Martin of the Martin Coal Company warns that some fuel other than hard coal, to which decades of use has accustomed the city, will have to be utilized if city homes to be kept warm this winter.

#### Soft Coal Available.

In expectation of the use of quantities of soft coal in the city during January and succeeding months, dealers today pointed out its qualities Soft coal gives a hotter and uses. Soft coal gives a hotter fire and, as a rule, leaves less ash. It burns more rapidly, however, and therefore requires more attention than hard coal. The method of hand-ling is also somewhat different.

Authorities agree that soft coal can be burned in an ordinary anthracite furnace without a change of The following simple rules for handling a soft coal fire are advanced by heating experts. It is assumed that the furnace and fuel are clean and that there are no leaky joints in any of the pipes leading from the heating plant. Soft coal creates a good deal of gas and if this leaks into the house the result will be unpleasent and possibly deal will be unpleasant and possibly dan-

A soft coal fire should be started by laying a deep bed of paper and wood on the furnace grate. This should be permitted to burn to embers before soft coal is added, and the coal should be put on slowly, a

While feeding the first charge of coal, the base door of the furnace should be open, and the draft in the feed door and the smoke-pipe dampers ajar. The coal should be permitted to slide off the shovel just
