Instruction was given in the principles and practice of cream separation and ripen-ing, churning, working and packing butter, and milk testing, which generally led to a discussion of various topics relative to general dairying. Considering the lateness of harvest and rather wet weather, the at tendance was good, averaging about twelve at each session, and running as high as ifty-five. The majority of those attending the classes were farmers' wives, and, as is generally found, those most anxious to improve were those already fairly well conversant wift the various processes. The interest was well sustained all through the series of meetings, students working heartily, and proving themselves eager to obtain all the information possible. The warm thanks tendered at the various places were most gratifying, and may be taken of harvest and rather wet weather, the at warm thanks tendered at the various places were most gratifying, and may be taken as indicative of the need and value of the work undertaken.
