CALAIS, France, May 2.—A French submarine, *Pluviose*, was sunk by the cross-channeler *Pas de Calais* yesterday, was located tonight after having driven from her mud moorings, bottom of the English Channel by the swift lower currents.

Tonight various craft are above the spot where lies the wreck with her dead company of divers. Sending down divers in endeavor to fasten chains about the wreck so it may be raised to the surface. The belief that the inner shell of the submarine was shattered by the explosion and that all the crew were drowned. The report that divers hearing the explosion from inside the Pluviose was discredited.
