The Ben Works.

In the matter of the Don works, after reviewing the history of the improvements, he concluded:

If it is the intention that the Don shall be made available for large vessels, one of two courses must be pursued. Steps must be taken to compel the Grand Trunk Railway to replace their present bridge by a swing bridge, or entrance to the new channel cannot be gained. I am, however, advised that there are grave objections to the construction of a railway swing bridge across the Don. The other alternative which has been suggested is that an arrangement should, if possible, be made with the Grand Trunk whereby it would cross the river on a stationary bridge at Winchester-struct, and enter the city by the west bank of the Don. The river could then be utilized by large vessels as fur up as Gerrard-street. There seems to have been no definite plan adopted for the carrying out of this improvement. This state of things should not be permitted to continue any longer, and I would respectfully suggest that a special committee be appointed to consider the whole matter and report to the Council what is best to be done under the circumstances.
