COLONISTS FOR CANADA.

THE COMMISSION WHICH WILL HAVE CHARGE OF AFFAIRS.

Mr. Charles Tupper and Many Distinguished Britishers Appointed Members of the Commission to be Formed of Scotch Crofters and Inhabitants of Congested Districts in Ireland.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The Pall Mall Gazette announces that Lord Lochlain, Hon. David Robert Pinkett, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir James King, Sir Robert Wilton, Sir Patrick and a number of others, including Mr. Skinner, director of the Northwest Land Co., have been appointed a commission to form colonies in Canada composed of Scotch crofters and inhabitants of congested districts in Ireland, using the funds already provided for that purpose.

A Scotch Minister Writes a Letter to the Queen.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Rev. Jacob Primmer, minister of a Presbyterian church at Dunfermline, has written a long letter to the Queen, in which he undertakes to give Her Majesty a religious lecture. He approves of the Queen attending the Kirk while she is in Scotland, in preference to the "corrupt" Popish Episcopal worship. He asks for stronger support of the Kirk and for Her Majesty's reading a number of tracts against the Church of Rome.

The Liberal's Latest Move.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The Liberal leaders have decided to incorporate in the platform approved at the Newcastle conference an election in one of the most important steps that party has ever taken. The question of ameliorating the position of British farmers by giving them greater security for their capital and freedom from harassing covenants imposed by landlords has long been recognized as ripening towards Liberal legislation.

The Salvation Army Opposed in Finland.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 20.—The authorities of Helsinki, the capital of Finland, are taking strenuous measures to prevent the Salvation Army and prevent the spreading of its doctrines in that country. Orders have been issued that the tracts and papers printed in the interest of the army be entirely suppressed, and the general newspapers have been warned, under penalty of punishment, to refrain from anything in their columns of the doings of the organization.

Milan Sells His Royal Rights.

BERGAMO, Nov. 20.—W. Dokhtsch hand, secretary of the Milan Council, has written the renunciation of King Milan of all his rights in Serbia in pursuance of an arrangement with the Government to buy the Milan 2,000,000 francs upon the conclusion of the act of renunciation, and to set foot on Serbian soil.

France Increasing Her Armament.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—M. Coehery of the Budget Committee to-day presented to the Chamber the estimates for the naval estimates. The estimates provide for many improvements in the navy and created armaments, especially quick-firing guns. Twenty ships are to be added to the Mediterranean squadron and the northern squadron is to be largely increased.

A Forgery to Aid the Bears.

BORDEAUX, Nov. 20.—The president of the bourse here received a despatch yesterday giving opening prices at 4 per cent. on the Paris loan at 84 francs. Rentes closed to-day 93 francs 85 centes, and equity developed on the fact that the object of the forgery was undoubtedly to aid a bear clique in its operations.

Church Disestablishment in Scotland.

GLASGOW, Nov. 20.—An address last night at Green Scotland, Lord Harington, speaking for himself and the Liberal-Unionists generally, said that it is a majority of the Scotch people who favor the disestablishment of the Scotch Church. He said that he would support such a movement. The announcement was met with great applause, and it having been supposed that the Government was ready for disestablishment in Scotland.

Like Results—Contrary Causes.

BREITENBURG, Nov. 20.—Herr Merz, teacher in a school for girls at Mensel, yesterday shot his wife and then committed suicide. The couple had been married but a fortnight.

Herr Breitenburg, a chemist of Koenigsberg, committed suicide to-day upon the grave of his betrothed at Coblenz.

Gen. Booth Gets \$10,000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—At his farewell meeting this evening Gen. Booth of the Salvation Army announced as the result of his Australian enterprise he had received a check for \$10,000 to aid him in his work in behalf of "darkest England."

France to Russia's Aid.

PARIS, Nov. 21.—The Gaulois says that negotiations have been almost concluded by which the Bank of France will contribute to the Russian Government with larger bailloons, the amount of 150,000,000 roubles, so as to enable the country to resume payments in specie.

Exportation of Russian Horses Prohibited.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Chronicle's Petersburg correspondent says it is expected the exportation of horses to Austria and Germany will be prohibited. This and the intended prohibition of the exportation of horses are regarded as having a military significance.

Eighty Farmers Drowned.

STONEY, N.S.W., Nov. 20.—Information has reached this place of a disaster at the Gilbert Islands in the Pacific. A steamer had been wrecked, and the life and damage to property throughout the group. Eighty persons were drowned on one of the islands.

WILL REBATE BLACK CATS.
