## CANADIAN FUNGI.

Thus far the reports of the Geological Survey of Canada have not listed the fungi of the Dominion. No very considerable number of this family of plants found in Canada has been reported or published hitherto. In the "Canadian Naturalist," Vol. II. (New Series), issued in 1865, there is found, pp. 390-3, "A Provisional Catalogue of Canadian Cryptogams," by Mr. D. A. P. Watt, which includes a list of the "Alliance Fungales" of our country, as known at Those collecting at that time had, however, that date. confined themselves mainly to the microscopic forms. Since then Mr. J. Dearness, of London, Ontario, has prosecuted the study of the latter, the Physomycctcs, but his collections have been reported mainly in American magazines, although two papers from him bearing on this subject have appeared in this journal (Volumes V. and The undersigned list, collected partly at Cap-a-VIII). L'aigle, in July and August, 1902, and partly around Montreal, in September and October, 1902, and from August to October, 1903, embraces 129 species. Of these only about 25 are mentioned in Mr. Watt's cutalogue, without any information as to where and when they were found. 7
