In Matt. xxv. 32, we have the following words of Christ addressed to the Jows: "And before Him shall be gathered all nations"-" Panta ta othne. which are precisely the same words, including, of course, the article, as He used in the commission. Will our correspondent say that "all nations" in this passage did not include the Jews ! fact has been overlooked that in some of the passages quoted the distinction between the Jow and Gentile is stated -"Give none offence, neither to the Jows nor the Gentiles," which distinction is often necessary, for in several places in the New Testament the Jewa are also called a nation.
