The maiden name of Lady Georgiana, was Walpole. She was a daughter of the second Earl of Orford. Somewhat eccentric herself, she became enamoured of the Rabbi's son, Joseph Wolff, whose exterior was not beautiful, nor by any means usually kept in trim order. The union proved happy. She accompanied her husband in his missionary excursions among the Jews and Mahommedans. In 1843 he was sent by the British Government to Bokhara, to ascertain the fate of Colonel Stoddart and Captain Conolly. This is one of the works referred to in the note. His missionary travels, he himself proclaimed in one of his books, surpassed those of St. Paul. "I, Joseph Wolff," he says, "also am an Israelite of the seed of Abraham, of the tribe of Levi, and I have preached the Gospel not only from Jerusalem round about Illyricum, but also from the Thames to the Oxus and the Ganges, and the New World." He was admitted to deacon's orders in the "New World," by Bishop Doane, of New Jersey. He in after years had the living of Isle-Brewers in Somersetshire, where he died in 1862.
