Canadian Trivia

 that the average Canadian holds 10 jobs throughout his life, almost half of them before he turns 30:

- that it costs an estimated \$84,000 to raise a child to age 18, but if you take into account 10% inflation the real cost would be \$200,000 (so says the Financial Post); that Canada has more houses hooked into cable per capita than any other country in the world:

 that Canadians spent \$900 million on toys last year. With 5.7 million children under the age of 14, that means each child was treated to an average \$147 worth of toys; that 3 out of 10 people have won prizes in lotteries during the last year and that 6 out of 10 participated in the \$14 million 6/49 lottery in January 1984. (including 85% of the people in Quebec and 59% in Ontario); that women's incomes grew by 16.83% during 1983 while men's rose by 11.19%.

- that we made a mistake last issue when we said that we no longer have any Consulates. In fact, although we have none headed by career officers, we do have 22 around the world that are headed by Honorary Consuls, three of whom are women (in Merida, Bombay and Belize); that since April 1984 there have been

660 removals. This means that 660 individuals or families have been moved either to or from Canada, or have been cross-posted:

- that in the last fiscal year, there were 1,171 removals involving 2,419 people; that last fall there was no national recruit-

ment for foreign service officers; that 4,328 people are in the Department

(annual report, 1983) and that 37.7% are female and 28.2% are francophone.

Although these posts have limited functions, they constitute a significant extension of Canadian representation abroad, and at very low cost. Many a travelling Canadian has been rescued from trouble by an honorary consul, and careerstaffed missions find these consulates provide valuable assistance in numerous other ways. As to your point about women heads of post, I'm glad to report that our service includes three women honorary consuls in Merida (Margaret Loggie, a former FS), Bombay and Belize.
