RUMOURED INVASION OF LAOS BY SOUTH VIETNAMESE TROOPS

Mr. T. C. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): I wish to direct a question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs regarding rumours coming from various parts of the world about an invasion of Laos by South Vietnamese troops backed by the American air force. Has the minister received any information from the Canadian members of the International Control Commission, the government of the United States or any other source which he can give to the House on whether such an invasion is actually in progress at the present time?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): No, Mr. Speaker. The blackout of news apparently applies to me as it does to everyone else.

Mr. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): Has the minister been in touch with the Canadian representatives of the International Control Commission? If not, will he endeavour to get in touch with them in order that we may obtain some information regarding this rumoured invasion of Laos?

Mr. Sharp: Mr. Speaker, we are, of course, regularly in touch with the members of the International Control Commission. They do not know anything either about the invasion that is being talked about in the newspapers.

Mr. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): In view of the serious consequences that such an invasion could have on worsening the already disastrous situation in southeast Asia, is the minister making representations on behalf of Canada to the government of the United States in the hope that any military activity now going on in southeast Asia will not be accelerated and escalated?

Mr. Sharp: Mr. Speaker, I know how difficult it is to get information about apprehended invasions.

Mr. W. B. Nesbitt (Oxford): Has the minister been able to obtain any information in this regard from our men in Peking, from Peking's representative here or directly from the Viet Cong?
