Dear Mr. Vice-Dean:-

I have given careful consideration to your letter of December 12th and to the proposal for a Summer School which you have there outlined.

I feel quite sure that the course would be an extremely interesting one, but I am not yet quite convinced as to its drawing power and would like to talk it over with people more in touch with the sources from which you might expect to obtain students.

There is, however, another point, and that is we must, I think, be prepared to find accommodation for students attending courses here, and we shall be hard put to it to get enough room for those coming for the French School. Macdonald is going to be full by reason of their own summer courses so that we cannot look for any help from them. Taking all this into consideration, while I do not wish you to think that the project is definitely set aside, I feel that it will be impossible to make arrangements this year.
