Recognizing this, they are one and all determined to be rid of the hideousness of war by continuing this one until it shall have so come home to the German nation that they shall have felt the ravage and desolation which they have sown themselves that the German people, exhausted, disillusionized, and betrayed, may rise in revolt against the militarism that has overreached their destiny.
