CHICAGO, June 16.—Stubbornly a decrease in May of 158,000 barrels. Last year the stocks were 2,322,000 burrels. bullish prices maintained in Europe, notwithstanding declines on this side Trade was about as dead as could be among local grain dealers to-day, no demand being noted in any quarter, and prices consequently holding comparatively unchanged from yesterday. The action of the Chicago and northwestern markets was not conducive to any feeling of bucyancy, yet the more favorable crop reports from the Western States were taken as only a tentative influence, as the advices are becoming more conflicting as the crop season advances.

Ontario grains are holding steady at the recent decline, but prices are purely nominal, as no trade is passing at the moment. Support by the principal longs in wheat was forthcoming on all depressions, despite the fact that rains were reported precisely where needed in the spring crop regions. Foreign strength appeared to have chiefly as a basis the fear aroused regarding growth conditions in Central and Southeastern Europe. Despatches were at hand telling of excessive moisture in Southern Russia and in Roumania, sharper demand in Germany, and a big falling off in shipments from the Argentine. Some traders professed also to see an element of at least temporary encouragement for the bull side because many offers of new wheat were being rejected here, most of the cash concerns having no additional storage room available. As the end of the day approached the volume of trade seemed to diminish, but, nevertheless, the close was steady. July ranged from 86 3-4c to 87 5-8c, with last sales 1-4c and 3-8c up, at 87 3-8c to 87 1-2c.

In oats there was good buying support on the breaks and free selling on the bulges. Heat damage reports were numerous, particularly from Iowa.
