Toronto and National Play at Scarborough

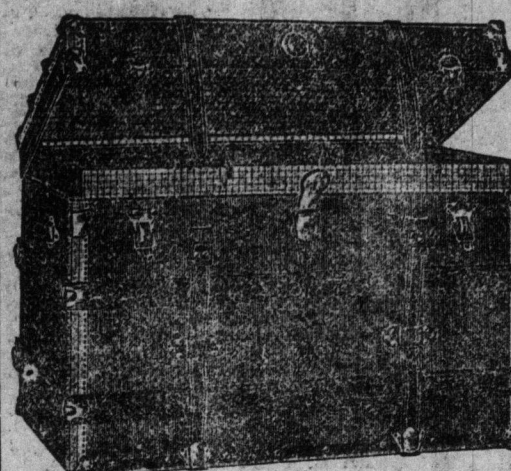
War Canoe Race.
