Washington, Jan. 22,—William Den-man, former chairman of the shipping board, teld the senate commerce com-mittee today that his position regard-ing wooden ships had been misrepre-sented to the public. He declared the press had "overplayed our hand in the matter of wooden ships," and said the impression that the beand was devoted to a wooden shippuilding policy only had done more harm to ship extensions in this country than anything else.
