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NEW YORK HORSE SHOW CHAMPIONSHIP AWARDS

Just Closed Attracted Larger Crowds Than Last Year, But Not Like Before the War.

New York, Nov. 15,-Championship Day brought the thirty-third annual national horse snow to a close tonight at Madison Square Garden. The show, which opened on Monday, has not attracted the large crowds of pre-war days, but the attendances have been larger than those of last year, and a substantial amount will be added to the United War Work Fund, all the profits going to that worthy cause. The expenses this year, however, have been higher than usual. The morning session opened with three classes for horses suitable to become hunters, all the winners then contestin for the championship of type. The winner of the title last year was the Boston horse, Cragwood, that entered as a green novice and left the Garden with a new owner, who had paid \$7000 for him.

"I was asked for my opinion on the draft rule, and told them that I thought it a mistake to entirely eliminate the draft. They should allow the majors to draft from Class AA and not from any class under that, but only one man from each club. The majors would then have to purchase any player they wanted below class AA. Then they would not be apt to draft a man from lower classifications and put them under optional agreement to class AA clubs should eliminate optional agreements. In my opinion the fundamental foundation of baseball is the advancement of the player in his profession, so by allowing player in his profession, so by allowing the draft in class AA the player will have the opportunity to advance in his pro-fession."


