## MURDERER FOOLED DOCTORS

Simulated Symptoms of Insanity—Betrayed by Another Convict.

New York, July 11.—Andrew Cucco, who is serving a life term in Sing Sing for murder, today testified how Martin Tighe, a inmate in the Tombs five years ago, had caused medical experts to believe Tighe insane. The trial of Tighe to-day for wife murder was the second time he had been examined.

When Tighe was first examined the principal thing which convinced the alienist of his insanity was the dryness and roughness of the man's skin. Cucco's testimony was that Tighe used a liniment with which to rub himself to make his skin rough and dry. As it was ascertained that he had used and honey, using on occasions when he expected to go before the commission as much as the juice of two dozen lemons mixed with honey.

Cucco said that Tighe told him he was "fooling the doctors fine," and when ever he appeared before them he would try to take off his shoes and disrobe, and that he would talk about buying farms, horses and chickens, until the doctors thought him insane of those subjects.

After Cucco's testimony Tighe pleaded guilty to manslaughter in the first degree, and was sentenced by Recorder Goff to 15 years and 10 months in Sing Sing.

## OBITUARY.

**Dr. A. H. Holliday.**—The death occurred at Traverse City, Mich., of Dr. Albert H. Holliday, a native of Brooklyn, Ont. He was educated at Port Perry and at Belleville, and for five years followed the profession of pedagogy, afterwards graduating from Toronto University, and continuing his studies from Victoria Medical College, Cobourg, where he received his M.D.C.M. degree. He practiced at Belwood, Ont., but in 1882 removed to Traverse City. At the time of his death he was president of the local medical association. Dr. Holliday was in his 47th year, and is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Charlotte Shaw of Port Perry, and three children.

**Mrs. Charlotte Emery.**—Mrs. Charlotte Emery of Port Burwell died suddenly this evening while chatting with her son on the veranda. Her late husband, who was customs officer here for a time, also died suddenly in 1899. Mrs. Emery leaves a son and two daughters, who are away on a trip to St. Louis. W. J. Jones, manager of the Standard Bank, Bowmanville, is a brother.

**Wins Out—A Record Run.**—Fort Erie racetrack is reached only by the Grand Trunk, passengers being landed at main entrance, and those who were led to believe through misleading advertising that another line could do the same, found out their mistake on opening day. The Grand Trunk gave a first-class service, the special with parlor car, leaving Toronto at 11:30 a.m., reached the racetrack at 1:32 p.m., returning train left track at 6:36 p.m., arriving Toronto 8:57 p.m. Two hours and twenty-one minutes for over a hundred miles is a record. The amateur Athletic Association will repeat the run on Saturday next, July 14, and are assured of a large attendance.

**Mother's Life for Daughter.**—Newark, N. J., July 11.—Mrs. Mary Dougherty of Brooklyn, who arrived last night at Newark with two young children, to spend the summer, went down to inspect their new bathhouse and wait for her husband, a Brooklyn contractor, who was expected on a later train. Rose, the 4-year-old daughter, fell into the lake and the mother jumped over the water, also she could swim. They were both drowned.

**Won't Co-Operate.**—Moscow, July 11.—The Zemstvo congress today adopted a resolution declining to co-operate with the government in the work of famine relief, while the present local and central administrations continue to confine their efforts to independent charity work.

## YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS EGLINTON SCHOOL MATTERS

Ratepayers Are Up in Protest as Result of Poor Showing in Recent Examinations.

Toronto Junction, July 11.—The town council met in special session to-night. A bylaw was read a second time, granting exemptions to the Francis Frost Mfg. Co., which will erect a building to cost \$12,000. The tenders for paving Keele-street, were referred to the board of works. A resolution was carried to rescind the motion of last meeting, re the owners of property paying half the cost. The invitation to visit Lemonville to inspect the proposed water supply was accepted. A motion condemning the action of Mr. Brown in connection with the Sunday street car service was carried by a vote of 8 to 2.

At the corner of Dundas and Keele-street, at 8 o'clock to-night, Toronto Street Railway Co. No. 230 was off the track about midnight. After the car was put on the track it caught fire underneath, and one of the firemen put out the fire with a small chemical engine. The damage was estimated at \$15.

The Senior Shamrocks journeyed to Brampton to-day and defeated that team by 15-2.

**North Toronto.**

Mr. Gaddy started to build a double house on Sherwood-avenue yesterday.

The Davisville baseball team, which is a branch of the North Toronto Sporting Association, challenges the Sons of England or any other team for a game next Saturday. F. L. McCreary, Eglington P.C., is the manager.

The Band of Hope of the Presbyterian Church went to the Children's Hospital yesterday afternoon with all kinds of good things for the sick little ones.

Eglinton Lodge, L.O.L., No. 289, will march from their lodge room at 10 o'clock this morning, headed by the 48th Highland Pipes, to the C.P.R. crossing, where they will board a special car and join in the procession at Toronto Junction.

The failure at the late entrance examination at Eglinton public school is the talk of the town. Only four out of twelve candidates passed. Ratepayers are making remarks as to alleged inefficiency of the school board and teaching staff. Principal Moore and the trustees say that the matter will be sifted at the board meeting on Thursday evening next.

James Chas. says "it is too ridiculous to pay the highest salaries to the teachers and get the minimum of results. The trustees are only interested themselves to increase the salaries of teachers, but seldom look to the benefit of the pupils." G. E. Oon remarks: "I pay my school taxes, but I send my son to a private school, where he learns something, although it is an extra burden on me." Councillor James T. Moore declares "it is up to the school board to find out what is wrong. There certainly is something out of joint. Surely the Eglinton scholars are not a picked lot of numbers. Councillor W. J. Lawrence says: "It is surely time for the school board and teachers to make up and put the Eglinton scholars in a better shape." G. Ellis says: "If only four out of twelve of Eglinton public school scholars passed their entrance examination, then it is the duty of the school board to make adequate provision against a recurrence of any such disappointing performance. Our citizens are likely to lay the blame upon the school's principal; this would be natural, but possibly such a poor performance in any of the lower grades would be easily corrected in the higher. Our principal may not have the privilege of plucking out the weeds from his staff if the board is better shaped. The board is liberal enough with our cash or they may interfere with the teachers' liberty. This has been done in the past. However, the result is damaging to the interests of the town. The unfortunate children are not the only sufferers, as the desirability of the town as a residential suburb depends largely upon the quality of our public schools. The children are all right. Examine the staff, examine the system, make it right, as the board can get the cash if larger salaries are necessary. We must have efficient schools." Some ratepayers have taken and send them to St. Clement's school.

The regular weekly meeting of the Davisville Young Men's Club was held in the school room of the Methodist Church. The meetings are growing in interest and attendance, their object being a worthy one—to create a better moral atmosphere by the introduction of clean, manly sports. The party numbered about 400. The York juvenile football team go to Highland Creek on Saturday, where they play the deciding game for a valuable cup.

Coronation L. O. L. will take part in the demonstration at Toronto tomorrow. They will be accompanied by the fire and drum band of the lodge.

**Arrested for \$50,000 Robbery.**—New York, July 11.—A man who described himself as James Stelman, an engineer, 24 years old, of Brooklyn, was arrested to-day on a charge of complicity in a \$50,000 diamond robbery which occurred in London in March, 1906. A man, Samuel Lockett, is alleged serving a five years' term in England in connection with the crime.

The victim was a salesman for a firm of French jewelers. He carried special diamonds and other jewels in a small hand satchel. It is alleged that Stelman and Lockett changed it for another similar in appearance.

## RAILWAY HEAVILY FINED.

For Granting Rebates—Two Officials Must Also Pay.

Chicago, July 11.—Judge Landis, in the United States district court, to-day sentenced the Chicago and Alton road, recently convicted of granting illegal rebate at Kansas City, to pay a fine of \$20,000 on each of two counts.

John Falhorn and Fred A. Wann, former officials of the road, were sentenced to pay a fine of \$5000 each on two counts.

The specific charge on which the defendants were convicted was that of giving to the Schwarzschmidt and Sulzberger Company a rebate of \$1 per car on all shipments from the Kansas City plant of the packing house.

**ENGINEER TO COMMISSION.**

Roseland Man to Adjust Values of Leases in Temiskaming.

The T. & N. O. Railway commission have received the acceptance of A. A. Cole, engineer and assessor of the War Eagle and Centre Star Mines, at Roseland, to become expert mining engineer to the commission. He reports for duty Aug. 1, and his duties will be to inspect all the ore mines under lease granted by the commission on their right of way and town site in order to correctly classify it. The lease call for 50 per cent. royalty on ore running over \$1000 per ton, and only a 25 per cent. royalty on ores below that value.

**IMPROVING ST. LAWRENCE.**

Ottawa, July 11.—The minister of marine has given orders for the construction at Sorel this season of a powerful spoon dredge that is required to excavate the shale that underlies the St. Lawrence River at Cap la Roche, between Quebec and Three Rivers.

It is also intended to install a system of telephones, which will be used in conjunction with wireless telegraphy to advise vessels of the presence of fog along the river.

**JUDGE MORSE DEAD.**

Halifax, N.S., July 11.—Hon. W. A. Morse, judge of the county court for Cumberland and Pictou counties, who died at Amherst this morning in his 70th year, was appointed by the Canadian government in 1876.

He was much interested in researches into the early history of the maritime provinces, and possessed historic documents.

Returning, the train left the track at 4:36 p.m. and arrived Toronto 8:57 p.m., two hours and twenty-one minutes run. The train was composed of engine No. 562, one baggage car fitted up as a buffet car, two vestibule coaches, and a parlor car, and was in charge of Conductor McCormick and Engineer Fish. **TO IMPROVE THE TRADE OF CANADA AND FRANCE.**

The British chamber of commerce in Paris, France, founded in 1875 to promote British trade relations with the French, has added a Canadian section, and asks Canadian manufacturers to join the new branch.

"It will be our duty," says a letter from the secretary, "to advocate the extension of the Franco-Canadian customs treaty, which has become more necessary now that a direct line of steamers exists between Canada and France."

**Daughter Contests Will.**

Alex. McCaughin of Caledon, who died on April 19, left an A.O.U.W. insurance policy of \$3000, and the A.O.U.W. at Osgoode Hall yesterday were given permission to pay two-thirds to the dead man's two sons, and the remaining third into court. Originally, the \$2000 was to go to the wife and three children, one a daughter, but the latter was omitted from the will. The court allowed the executor to take legal action, alleging that undue influence was used to induce her father to amend the policy.
