Sofia, Bulgaria, Aug. 3.—The tomb of M. Stambuloff, the ex-Premier of Bulgaria, who was assassinated in the streets of Sofia in July last year, has been seriouly injured with a dynamite bomb.

Once before, in August of last year, M. Stambuloff's grave was made the object of outrages by vandals, the cross on the grave being broken the wreaths destroyed and attempts were being made to exhume the body when the police interfered.
