Must Produce Consular Bills of Health on Entering U. S. Ports. Detroit, Mich., May 11.-The Treasury Department intends to compel ail Canadian vessels arriving at American lake ports to produce consular bills of health as prescribed by the Quarantine Act of Feb. 15, 1893. The order contained in a circular of April 2 is the result of the prevalence of smallpox in many localities this year. Some think, however, that the order has been inspired by the action of the Canadian authorities in demanding the same papers from vessels leaving Cleveland. The order will make untold trouble for Canadian boats.
