ANOTHER BRILLIANT VICTORY WON BY THE BRITISH FORCES

Lord Methuen's Column, Advancing to the Relief of Kimberley, Routed 3000 Boers From Strong Positions at Belmont.

Imperial Losses Were Very Heavy, and it Was Another Costly Victory-The Guards Carried the Last Ridge at the Point of the Bayonet-Dutch Rising in Cape Colony-A Ring Leader to Be Tried For Treason.

Lord Methuen's column, advancing for the relief of the beleaguered British at Kimberley, came into conflict with the Boer forces at daybreak yesterday morning.

THE BATTLE AT BELMONT.

Official Despatch From Gen. Lord Methuen Giving Details of the Victory, Which Was Complete-The British Casualties.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—The Secretary of War has received the following despatch, through Gen. Forestier-Walker, from Gen. Methuen, dated Belmont, Nov. 23:

Attacked the enemy at daybreak this morning. He was in strong position. Three ridges were carried in succession, the last attack being prepared by shrapnel. Infantry behaved splendidly and received support from the naval brigade and artillery.

Our victory was complete. Have taken forty prisoners. Am burying a good number of the Boers, but the greater part of the enemy killed and wounded were removed by their comrades.

Brig.-Gen. Fetherstonhaugh was severely wounded in the shoulder, and Lieut.-Col. Crabbe, of the Grenadier Guards, is reported wounded.

Our other casualties are: GRENADIER GUARDS—Third Battalion: killed, Lieut. Fryer; wounded, Lieut. Blundell, dangerously.

SECOND BATTALION—Wounded, Lieut. Leslie, Lieut. Vaughan, Lieut. Gurdon-Rebow and Lieut. Russell; reported wounded, Lieut. Lyon and Lieut. Cameron.

GRENADIER GUARDS—Rank and file, killed 26; wounded 36, missing 13.

COLDSTREAM GUARDS—First Battalion: wounded, Lieut. Grant; Second Battalion, wounded, Lieut. The Hon. C. Willoughby and Lieut. Burton, the latter severely.

RANK AND FILE—Killed 8, wounded 23, missing 5.

SCOTS GUARDS—First Battalion, wounded, Major Hon. North Dalrymple-Hamilton, severely; Lieut. Bulkeley and Lieut. Alexander; Rank and File, killed 9, wounded 34.

NORTHUMBERLAND FUSILIERS—First Battalion: killed, Capt. Eagar and Lieut. Brine; wounded Major Rashwood and Lieut. Festing, dangerously; Capt. Sapte and Lieut. Fishbourne, severely.

RANK AND FILE—Killed 12, wounded 32.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE REGIMENT—Second Battalion, wounded, Capt. Freeland and Lieut. Barton, severely.

SOUTH YORKSHIRE REGIMENT—Second Battalion, rank and file, wounded 3.

CHAS. A. BROWER AND DANIEL M'INTYRE

Are Now "Up Against" Each Other Once More in East Elgin.

CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE

Was Nominated by a Large and Enthusiastic Convention at Aylmer Yesterday.

THERE WAS NO NOTE OF DISCORD.

The Candidate, Mr. Ingram, M. P., and Mr. A. W. Wright Made Telling Speeches.

Aylmer, Ont., Nov. 22.—At one of the largest and most enthusiastic conventions ever held in East Elgin, C. A. Brower was unanimously renominated as the Conservative candidate for the Local Legislature. Every polling subdivision in the riding was represented, and the delegates expressed themselves determined to re-elect Mr. Brower to the seat, of which he had been deprived by what even the judges characterized as a trivial violation of the law by an agent.

Speeches were delivered by the candidate, by A. B. Ingram, M.P., and A. W. Wright, Conservative organizer for Ontario.

Mr. Brower's speech was brief and telling. He claimed that the result of the recent election had left no man, either upon himself or the party supporting him. Mr. Ingram spoke strongly of the injustice which, he claimed, all fair-minded men felt had been done to Mr. Brower by the decision of the Court of Appeal, and said that it was a mistake to think that a decision should be given which would be too apt to create the belief that certain of the judges were not as free from partiality as they ought to be.
