GRAND TRUNK TO FIGHT PROPOSAL TO NATIONALIZE

Resents Imputations Cast by the Drayton-Acworth Report.

SMITHERS AT MONTREAL

System Is Prepared To Make Any Improvements Required.

Montreal, May 15.—The Grand Trunk Railway is opposed to the nationalization scheme outlined in the Drayton-Acworth report, and it is believed this has brought A. W. Smithers, chairman of the board of directors, to Canada. Mr. Smithers reached Montreal today. The London board of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific resents the imputation cast by the Drayton-Acworth report on the financial strength of the Grand Trunk.

It is understood that the Grand Trunk directors desire the nationalization of the Grand Trunk Pacific if they are relieved of further financial responsibility for their road, and are reimbursed to the extent of their investment in the western company. They will fight the nationalization of the Grand Trunk System, and are prepared and have the financial resources to make any Improvements or additions to equipment required.

BEANS AS SUBSTITUTE FOR POTATOES URGED

Ottawa, May 14 .- The follow ng statement was issued fepartment of agriculture The enthusiasm displayed in the matter of planting potatoes is only equaled by the enthusiasm with which potato prices are climbing up. It now costs from forty-five to fifty dollars for seed to plant an acre of potatoes. It is obvious that at these prices potatoes do not give sufficient food value. Housekeepers could well eliminate the potato and turn to more economic foods, and by such elimination leave that by such elimination leave that much more seed to be planted for the much-needed crop this year.

In the scarcity of potatoes it would be well for planters to turn to the question of beans. The same money that will plant an acre of potatoes, if invested in beans, will provide seed for more than ten acres. They are not only an excellent and nutritious form of food, but it looks as if they will continue to be in strong demand for army supplies, and companies with army contracts, are offering as high as polies, and companies with army contracts, are offering as high as five dollors a bushel for this year's crop. Soils suitable for potatoes are generally also suit-able for beans.
