TEMPERANCE ACT CUTS DRUNKS TO 4 FROM 33 IN 1916

Fair-Time Celebrants But Few This Year.

ONE IS ASSESSED \$200

Indian Maiden, Arrested at Fair Grounds, Had Bottle in Possession.

That the Ontario temperance act has been successful in reducing the number of drunks during fair week was evidenced by the fact that only four persons charged with intoxication appeared in police court today, compared with 33 who were lined up on the same day a year ago.

Three out of the four who pleaded guilty to intoxication today were Indians. Janeta Patterson, an Indian maid, whose home is on the Ontario reservation, was arrested at the fair grounds last night in company with her friend, and was found with a bottle of whisky in her possession.

She was both brought to the police station, and the woman was charged under section 41 with having liquor in her possession. She was fined \$200 and costs. The other three who pleaded guilty were charged with intoxication.

The third Indian, a resident of Amherst, was fined \$100 and costs. When asked if he would be able to identify the man who sold him the bottle of whisky, he didn't think it possible, as he was more interested during the race than in looking at the bottle of whisky than at the man.

CLARION CALL TO THE RED CROSS WORKERS OF LONDON DISTRICT

Speakers From Overseas. At Annual Meeting Held Yesterday, Tell of What Red Cross Does In England and In France—Officers Re-elected.

At no time in the history of the London County, London Red Cross Auxiliary, since the outbreak of the great war has more enthusiastic interest been manifested than on the occasion of the annual meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Masonic Temple. The national headquarters of the Red Cross, the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire of London district which ship through the London centre were represented by delegates, and these, along with local workers, filled the hall to its capacity. The usual record of an annual meeting was reviewed by the fact that instead of having the reports of all the officers and committees read as is usually the case, these have been accepted at a meeting of the executive some weeks ago, and the reports were read as a business was transacted with greatest possible dispatch, and from beginning to end, not a minute was wasted or allowed to drag.

The election of officers, marked by the return of those who rendered such efficient service during the past year. A new officer was added, and the fourth vice-president, Mrs. G. E. Saxe, of the London County, London Red Cross, presided during this part of the business.

The officers now stand as follows: Honorary president, Mrs. H. A. Boomer; honorary vice-president, Mrs. H. B. Rucker; honorary secretary, Mrs. J. E. Macdonald; vice-presidents, Mesdames C. Wright and E. B. Leonard; honorary treasurer, Mrs. A. E. Cooper; honorary secretary, Mrs. J. E. Macdonald; recording secretary, Mrs. A. T. Edwards. The addresses, which constituted a large part of the program, held the enraptured attention of the audience and carried conviction from the fact that they were delivered by three people who have come into close grips with the war and its realities. Miss McIntosh, who is a chaplain in the Canadian Forces, and who has been in France many months ago, and Capt. (Rev.) A. Graham, who rendered overseas service for almost a year as a chaplain.

The music also was of a heart-stirring nature, a solo by Miss Leonard, and a quartet by the "Home" that brought mist to the eyes and a thrill to the throat, and the song "For the Sake of the Front," sung by the whole audience, was a fitting conclusion to the beginning of the printed report.

The opening prayer was offered by Rev. J. E. Macdonald, and was a review of the work of the past year and in progress at the present time of the London County, London Red Cross, along with suggestions of plans for the future constituted the presidential address delivered by Lady Beck.

Warm Tributes. A warm tribute was paid to the work of the V. A. D.s at the Havre hospital, and to the women of England as a whole who have given their hearts and soul to the winning of the war. "The V. A. D.s," said the speaker, "are expected to do what the men do, and to do it without being told after that much cannot be said in appreciation of these intelligent, capable women."

So far as the British Government is concerned, Miss McIntosh regards as unfounded the statements about the blundering and superabundance of red tape of the army.

The British army is a wonderful organization," she said, "and it is wonderful the way it has worked. You hear a great deal about the red tape, but there are few articles within common sense you cannot get in a British hospital. Work on. Do the biggest things you can for these men, and you will never be able to do enough," said Miss McIntosh.

Says "Carry On." Capt. (Rev.) A. Graham, like the preceding speakers, sounded a clarion call to the Red Cross workers of Western Canada to "carry on" and to be more consecrated themselves to the part they can play in winning the war by Red Cross and war relief work, by conservation of food.

There is one way in which the war might be ended, he said, and that is by compromise with baseness and a crude compromise of things which would take out of the world the things for which Christ died. Unless we compromise, we shall win the war, but we shall lose the peace.

There is just one thing to do, go on and fight to the finish, with the breakdown of this war, it will be at least another year. Recently there were 8,000 Canadian casualties, and in the same length of time, 400 men were recruited to fill the gaps. What have the men who fought at Vimy Ridge to say on this subject? Are they willing to compromise with Kaiser Bill? Ask them, and they will answer in thundering tones to the bombardment of great guns. "No, this must be fought out to the end," said the speaker.

Concerning the impression received by Capt. Graham on his recent return to Canada, he said, "The first ten days after I came back to Canada I was sick at heart. I wondered if I had really realized there was a war as I watched the motor cars roll by on pleasure bent. Over in England there wasn't an automobile in use excepting for the few that were used by the members of my congregation if there was no more walking and no more cycling. 'Yes, thirty-five cents a gallon.' I am going to mention by way of showing that I am not a pacifist. In England the name of a young Londoner, Major Thornley, who recently was awarded the Victoria Cross for his gallantry in the war, was mentioned. Lines of communication were kept open under shell fire twenty times in a day, only a few miles from the front. He had frequently spent hours with her, but it was impossible for him to see her in a week at a time. He won the war to get an ounce of gasoline to run his car to London."

Like the Socks. The subject of "socks" was presented from a new angle. While all the speakers sent much appreciation according to Lieut. Aiken, no one has greater than that of socks. "Kittens take a lot of time," he said, adding, "Some people cannot manage to put on one pair in a week at a time. I know what it is to give up their men folk."
