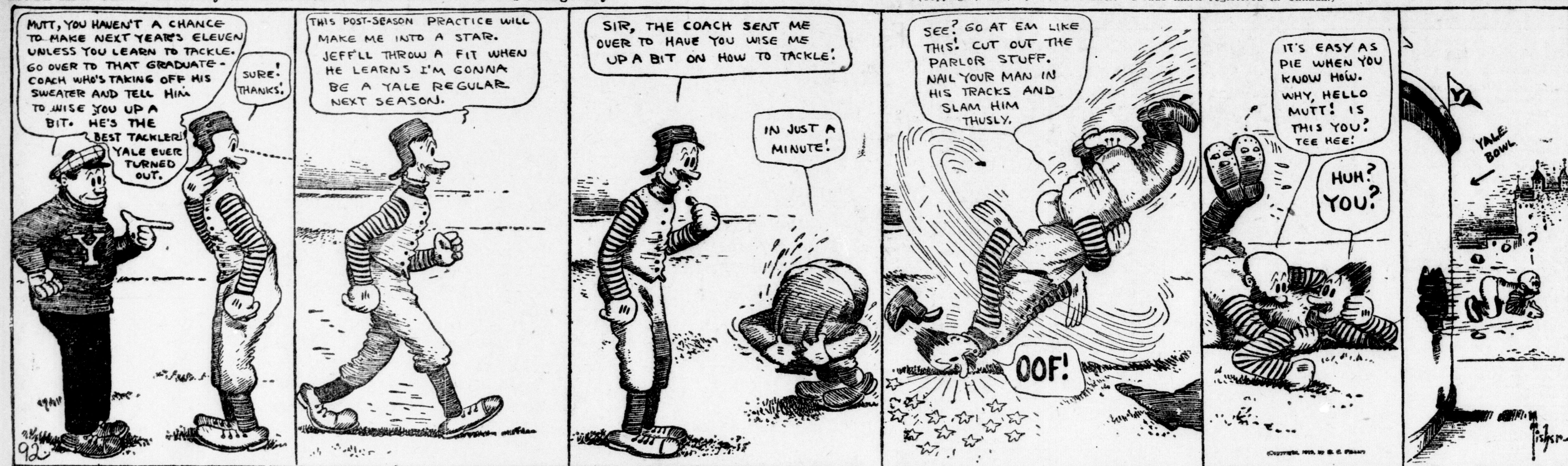

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## Wilde May Appear Here As Third Man

G. A. C. Have Assurances That If Possible English Marvel Will Come Here To Referee Main Bout of December On Card.

It is possible, almost a certainty, that London boxing fans will have a chance to see Jimmy Wilde, the English flyweight champion, but he'll be the third man in the ring instead of one of the principals. The G. A. C. authorities, who are staging the card here on December 12, have practically made certain of "the Fighting Atom's" appearance in that role here. Wilde appears in Detroit on the night of the 16th, and in a few days it is expected that news of a bout for Toronto shortly after that date will be announced, which would make London in the nature of a stop-over for the British wonder.

During the war Wilde was a sergeant on the gymnastic staff of the British army, and he has indicated that any soldier organization in Canada would have first call on his services after his American bout.

The Tremaine-Atkins box is practically a certainty with Goodrich, an alternative. Gunner Smith of Woodstock may also be given a chance again on this card, as his showing at his debut against Gallagher in Toronto last week would seem to warrant it. As an additional attraction, a promotional bout, Hal left of the G. A. C. is now in Montreal.

## SARNIA AND CAPITALS CLASH HERE IN FINAL CHAMPIONSHIP TILT

Saturday Is Day Fixed For Sudden-Death Fixture—Teams Evenly Matched, Say Officials.

It was thought that Sarnia and Capitals would play home-and-home games for the championship, although no official notification had come through to that effect, but according to the Toronto Star, the clash is billed for London next Saturday.

If the game comes off here, London fans will witness one of the best games they've ever had a chance to witness. The Star says the two teams are evenly matched.

"The O. R. F. U. Intermediate finals will bring together two evenly-matched fourteeners, in Capitals and Sarnia. On the 11th the battle should be about fifty-fifty, though Sarnia hasn't a line-plunger like 'Labe' Shepherd, nor a running half as effective as 'Lion' Conacher. In weight and all-round effectiveness the teams size up about even. Sarnia should show the most speed getting down under kicks, and perhaps are better tacklers. Harding, who is a real clever player, will give 'Duke' Hennessy a great tilt for booting honors."

## JOE WRIGHT SIGNS 3-YEAR CONTRACT

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 2.—Joe Wright, the famous Canadian rowing coach, yesterday signed a three-year contract to coach the University of Pennsylvania crew. Previous to this Wright has worked at the Red and Blue Institution on one year contract, but his work has met with such universal favor among Penna. men that it was thought better to him up on a three-year contract than risk the possibility of losing him to a rival college.

Wright came to Penn in 1916, and since that time has rapidly placed the Red and Blue in the front rank of inter-collegiate rowing. In 1918 and last year he was runner-up for the inter-collegiate title.

## PLAN TO RAISE FUNDS TO SEND TRAPSHOOTERS TO OLYMPIC GAMES

New York, Dec. 2.—A plan for raising funds to defray the expenses of a trap-shooting team at the Antwerp Olympic games, was before the joint meeting of the executive and amateur committees of the American Trap Shooting Association here today. The committee also planned a program for the 1920 season, which it was announced would be the best in the history of the sport in this country. Other questions included revision of the shooting rules, division of the United States and Canada into zones to increase efficiency in management of the sport, methods of assessing dues of amateurs, and elimination of conflicting tournaments.

## JOHNSON SUPPORTS HIS DECISION IN CALLING MEETING AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Dec. 2.—In calling the annual meeting of American League club owners for Chicago, President Dan Fogarty, yesterday afternoon, according to a statement made public today, Mr. Johnson was commenting on the injunction proceedings begun by the Comiskey-Frazee-Ruppert faction to prevent him calling the meeting here, and looking toward holding it in New York.

Why the three minority directors, Charles A. Comiskey of Chicago, H. H. Frazee of Boston and Jacob Ruppert of New York, should wish to hold the meeting in New York, Mr. Johnson said he could not understand.

## BICYCLE RIDERS ARE TIED IN 32ND HOUR

New York, Dec. 2.—Fourteen teams in the six-day bike race at Madison Square Garden were still tied at 8 o'clock this morning, the 32nd hour. They had covered 641 miles and 5 laps at that time. The French-Belgian team of Chardon and Thiersghien had fallen one lap behind the others, who were led by Drobach of the Boston team. The record for the 32nd hour is 700 miles and 1 lap, made by Lawson and Root in 1915.

## CHAMPIONSHIP TENNIS GAMES BEING PLAYED

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 2.—The first of a series of matches for the recent tennis championship of the United States between Jay Gould, American amateur champion, and Walter Kinsella, professional title holder, was held at the Racquet Club here today. The player taking the greatest number of out of thirteen sets will win the title.

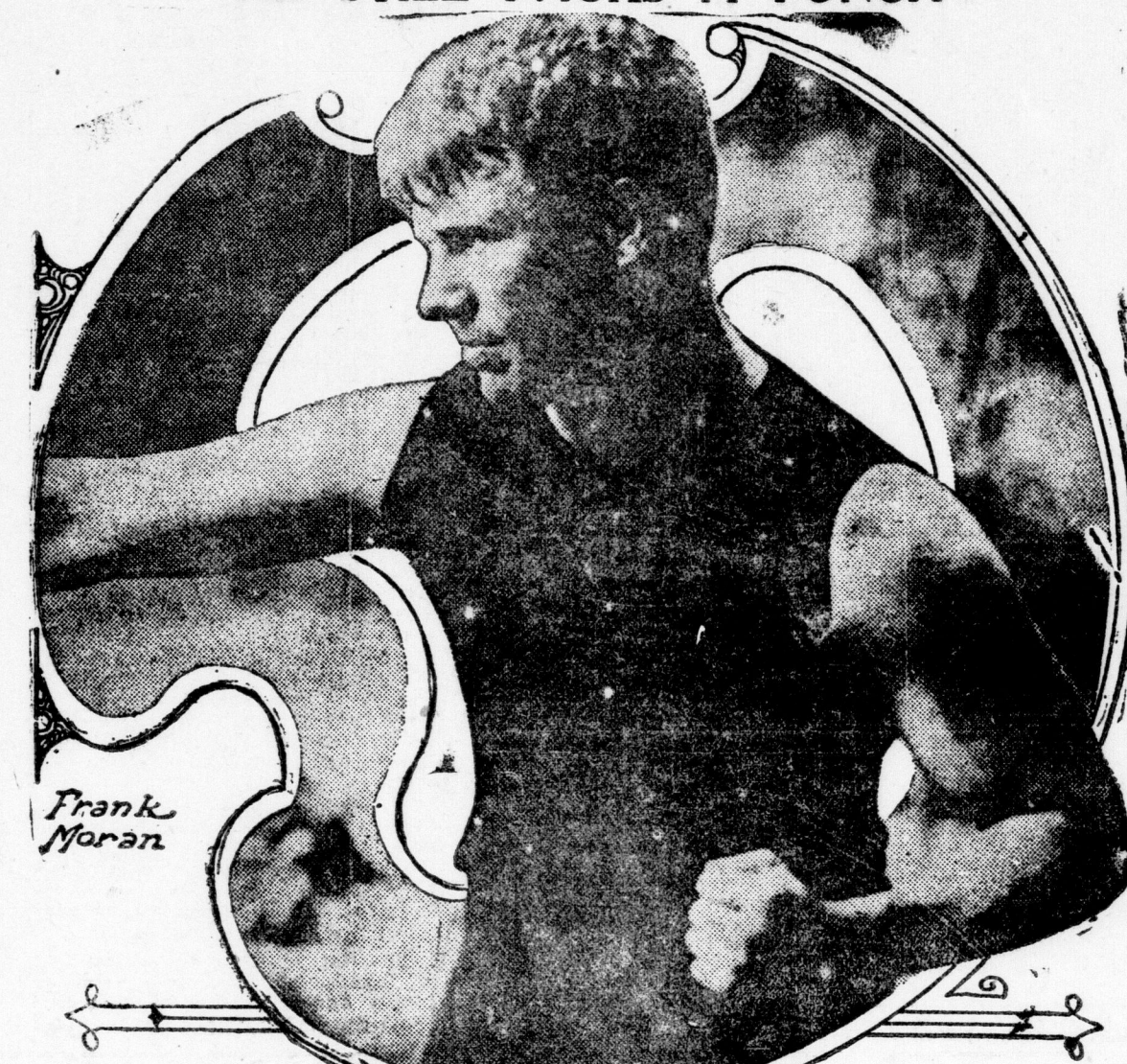
Win or lose, Kinsella will receive a purse of \$2,000, while Gould will be awarded a silver cup. Both players are said to be in excellent form.
