Press.) — "Co-speration rather than agitation," as a means of combatting the present serious unemployment situation is urged by National Secretary C. G. MacNell of the Great War Veterans' Association, in a telegram dispatched tonight to all the provincial commands of his association. Mr. MacNell's telegram was sent, following the close of the sessions of the executive of the employment service council of Canada, and comrades throughout all sactions of the nation were urged to co-operate with provincial and municipal governments. organized labor and organized employers in the attempt to relieve the situation.

Mr. MacNell's telegram states that while the unemployment situation is undoubtedly strious, he is very hopeful of a solution through the co-operation of all organizations interested, federal provincial and local, with the authorities on the basis of the agreement reached at the national council executives meeting.

Co-operate Locally.

The national secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association urges that provincial commands immediately coperate in following the program in conjunction with provincial and local units of employers and organized labor. The national bodies of these interests, the secretary states, are now simultaneously arranging to act at all points. To accomplish the necessary degree of co-operation, Provincial Governments are being urged by the Federal Government and the employment service agreement with representation for returned soldiers.
