GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Opening Session Will Be Held in Winnipeg This Evening.

WINNIPEG, June 2.—(Special).—The opening of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church takes place to-morrow evening at Knox Church.

The moderator, Rev. Dr. Campbell, and Rev. Dr. John Somerville, treasurer of the western section of the church and joint clerk of the assembly, are expected to reach Winnipeg this evening to complete arrangements. There is a great deal of highly important business, some of special interest to the west, including overtures concerning the supply of men for the ministry; supervision of students; evangelistic work; church union; representation of elders in church courts; payment of missionaries; church cooperation; and new presbytery for Saskatchewan and the division of Qu'Appelle presbytery; business of a miscellaneous nature coming before assembly will include consideration of the resignation of Principal MacLaren; greeting to assembly from Korea; nomination for the chair of the assembly, theology, Halifax, and reports on church union, Presbyterian Churches in India, and temperance, social and moral reform.

"DEMON-WATER" NOW.

Aquamania is Said to Be a Really Dangerous Habit.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 2.—Intoxication may be induced by too copious use of water externally or internally, according to Dr. L. D. Mason, vice-president of the American Society for the Study of Inebriety, Alcohol and Drug Neurosis. The habit he described as being as dangerous as over-indulgence in alcohol.

Dr. Mason, who comes from Brooklyn, made that declaration in an address last night to the members of Washington Home, on "Why Men Drink."

I have a friend who is a victim of aquamania," he said. "He spends hours in a bathtub and drinks so much water that he has reduced the solids of his body and worked serious injury to himself. Many men and women drink too much water and are victims of that form of intoxication."

FIGHT ANTI-AUTO LAW.

Car Run in Charlestown to Test Validity.

CHARLESTOWN, P.E.I., June 2.—Auto owners to-night ran a car around the city in order to furnish a test case against the recent legislative enactment prohibiting the running of autos in the province.

The autoists point out that in 1902 the government incorporated a law to operate motor vehicles, and in 1903 granted the franchise to operate "trucks" trolleys. This encouraged the purchase of motor cars by others, who are now threatened with a "dead loss" as no indemnity is provided for.

ART SCHOOL WILL GET EVERY CONSIDERATION

Hon. Dr. Pyne's Reply to Directors' Request—Labor and Conservative Candidates Speak.

HAMILTON, June 2.—(Special).—At the meeting of the Hamilton Art School directors this afternoon, Rev. Dr. Lyle announced that a deputation had waited upon Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, to see what attitude of the government would be towards the school in the event of a technical college being started here. The minister of education had promised the art school every consideration, declaring that it was the best art and technical institution in the province and would be looked after. The salary of J. J. Scott, K.C., and the other being held a short distance away in the interests of the labor candidate, Allan Stodolme.

Mr. Scott excused himself for not saying anything on the power question in his previous speeches, because he had just returned from a trip abroad and did not know that the council was considering the question of closing a contract with the hydro-electric commission, but the commission was a creation of the Whitney government and he would support it. John Hoodless presided, and Hon. C. Matheson was one of the principal speakers. He defended the record of the government and explained the reasons why the C.N.R. guarantees were brought down in the last week of the legislature was because the company was holding off for a larger guarantee and only accepted the arrangement afterwards made because it did not get a larger guarantee. The other speakers were Hon. J. S. Hendrie, Geo. S. Lynch, Stanton, K.C., and C. R. McCullough. There were about three hundred present.

At the labor meeting in Britannia Park there was a crowd of some 600 or 700. The speakers were Walter W. Hevey and Jas. Kenney of Toronto. All the speakers endorsed the cheap power movement and municipal ownership. Arthur Males, Dickson-street, was taken to the City Hospital this afternoon with a bad scalp wound. He fell off a wagon alighting on his head on a pavement.

The Hamilton students met their first defeat at Britannia Park when they were trimmed this afternoon by the London Beavers, the score being 7 to 2. Nelson Long pitched for Hamilton, and London got 12 hits off him while Hamilton was able to find Payne for six hits. The Beavers were in the seventh and had to retire, Macey coming in from right field to take his place and Gleason going to right field. The score by innings:

The police are looking for P. Cook, who represented himself as a hide buyer from Chicago, and who is alleged to have fleeced several local banks out of various sums of money. He did not succeed, however, owing, he says, to the English markets being flooded with Canadian bonds. He will return to England shortly. At an annual meeting of the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway today, the following directors were elected: W. K. Vanderbilt, W. H. Newman, Henry B. LeMay, J. N. Beckley, Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, David McNicoll, Charles F. Cox, E. B. Osler, M.P., Nicol Kingsmill, W. P. Torrance and D'Arcy Scott.

Grand Jury Criticized. There was a warm discussion in the county court to-day over the presentment of the grand jury at the last assizes, in recommending the erection of a poorhouse by the county. Dr. Bruce-Smith, inspector of prisons and charities, and Sheriff Middleton, both urged the councillors to do their duty in the matter and provide for the poor of the county, instead of unloading them on the city. Some of the councillors insinuated that Sheriff Middleton had prompted the grand jury in its presentment, and the sheriff made an emphatic denial. A motion was carried to have the matter thrown out.
