PEOPLE TO VOTE UPON

City Council, in One Hour Session, Gets Thru Some Important Business.

A regular city council meeting which lasts only an hour is something unusual, especially when municipal elections are getting near. But that's what happened yesterday.

The credit belongs mostly to Ald. Church, who was chairman of the committee, and whose manner of disposing of business was brisk, not to say cyclonic. Even Ald. Foster was apparently overawed by the executive style of Ald. Church, and didn't once question an item in the accounts.

Foster opposed one feature—the live stock arena and music hall to cost \$110,000—but he neither made a fiery onslaught, nor did he venture on the still more risky ground of humor. Neither was he loquacious. He simply affirmed a belief that the arena was a luxury not needed for a few years, and that with a bylaw for half a million for Ashbridge's marsh, and another for new fire halls and police stations, it was a time to economize. Then came the vote, which gave a fair working majority for submitting the bylaw, Ald. Foster being the only dissentient.
