**WARNING SENT TO  
THE HOCKEY CLUBS**

The O.H.A. have sent the following notice to clubs: Under separate cover birth certificates registered with the Ontario Hockey Association for the playing season of 1920-21, are being returned to the clubs. Please note that when applications for players are made, the birth certificate of the O.H.A. are being made required for all players, including those registered in past seasons, and new ones who intend to play in the association for the first time.

Your particular attention is also drawn to "Clause 14" of the regulations of the Ontario Hockey Association which reads as follows:

"Each club shall have a set of books setting forth the receipts and expenses of each year in detail, which books may be examined by the O.H.A., or any of its officers, at any time. The set of books is to contain list of cash book and ledger, and a complete statement of receipts and expenses for the season must be filed with the secretary of the O.H.A. on or before the 15th of the month following each club in the association. The first of such statements is to be filed by April 15, 1921. Failure to comply with this clause automatically suspends a club from membership in the association."

There shall be no exception made in enforcing this regulation and this notice must be taken as final.

**LOOKS LIKE VANCOUVER  
TO LIFT STANLEY CUP**

Vancouver, B.C., April 1.—In the most vicious hockey battle of the present world championship series, Vancouver defeated the Senators of Ottawa, 3 to 2, here last night, and opened up the race for the Stanley Cup. It was the fourth game of the series, and the first in which each team has won two.

The final game will be played on Monday night under Pacific Coast Hockey Association rules, with Skinner and Mackay line-up. The midwestern players are being urged to play hard, and carry on the Senators' fight because Vancouver attacked close to Benedit before leaving to close the season.
