EXPLOSION STARTS  
A FIERCE FIRE

A \$75,000 Conflagration in the Mercantile Section of Toronto.

Toronto, July 8.—With the sudden roar of an explosion fire burst out at 7:40 this morning in the basement of a four-story brick building at 18-20 Sheppard street, owned by Jones Bros. & Co., and occupied by Smith & D'Entremont, comb manufacturers, in the basement and first floor; P. T. Corcoran, builders' contractor, in the second floor, and Jones Bros. & Co. on the top flat. In almost less time than it takes to write it the whole building was a roaring furnace.

Had the fire occurred an hour later when all the hands were at work there can be little doubt that there would have been fatalities to deplore, but fortunately although several men had narrow escapes nobody was seriously hurt.

## MAULED BY A BEAR

Hunter Shot Cub and Was Terribly Punished by the Mother.

Victoria, B. C., July 8.—Details of a thrilling encounter between a man and a bear, far from human assistance, in arriving this week from Vancouver Island, have just leaked out here with the release of Lieut. Kingscott, R. N., from a hospital, where he has been for a month past suffering from wounds inflicted by the monster. Lieut. Kingscott had been out shooting and in preparing to return was taking a last look round for game. Suddenly a black bear emerged, and at first sight of the animal the sportsman took a flying shot. The beast was frightened and moved away. Following in her tracks he came across a young cub, at which he fired with fatal effect. The little animal uttered a painful howl. Immediately the mother came rushing back growling with rage. As she emerged he fired point blank, hitting her in the chest when she was scarcely fifteen yards distant. She staggered and he loaded and again fired as she was almost upon him. The second shot took effect, serving to allow the man time to draw his sheath knife. The bear carried past him in the mad rush, wheeled and threw herself on the lieutenant, burying her teeth in his shoulders and tearing his face with her claws. He plunged his knife into the animal's heart.

## SCHOONER ACACIA LOST

Driven Ashore in Big Gale at Sackett's Harbor, New York.

Watertown, N. Y., July 8.—The three-masted schooner Acacia, owned and captained by Williams Simmons, of Kingston, went ashore on Bull Rock Point, near Sackett's Harbor, today, and late today the crew was rescued by Sam Spencer Goble, of Sackett's Harbor, who, after a struggle of several hours, managed to reach the stranded craft in a small boat. The eight persons on board included two women.

The Acacia was of 380 tons burden and left Oswego late last night for Kingston, Ont., with a cargo of coal. Early this morning a heavy gale carried away part of her rigging. While trying to make Sackett's Harbor she grounded and was rapidly being pounded to pieces.

When the Acacia grounded and the waves dashed over it those on board never expected to reach land and spent the night in prayer. The boat will probably be a total loss.

FIRE CHIEF HOWARD  
IS "MAKING GOOD"

Is Getting Things Down Fine in Peterboro—Writes to a London Friend.

Fire Chief W. A. Howard, of Peterboro, formerly a member of the London Fire Brigade, writes a friend in this city as follows:

"No doubt it will be interesting to you to know that everything is well with me here. I have the work of re-organization of the permanent fire department, well in hand. We have splendid quarters here. It is a brand new fire station, just built last year. We have a Seagrave truck, and a hose wagon, on the left hand side of the hall. My office is in the centre on the ground floor, and to the right is the fire chief's buggy, steam fire engine, and then the chemical combination, something similar to the ones you have at home. The building is magnificently furnished throughout, and beautifully illuminated by night. I am beginning to feel very much at home."

DRESDEN GIRL  
TRIES SUICIDE

Said To Have Been Intimated With Young Man Who Did Not Reciprocate.

Detroit, July 8.—The News says: Miss Hattie McDonnell, 19 years old, whose parents live in Dresden, Ont., now lies in a semi-conscious condition on a cot in St. Mary's Hospital, continually calling for "Hart Bentley" who, she asserts, is her sweetheart.

Miss McDonnell is believed to be suffering from the effects of several morphine tablets, which she is supposed to have taken late yesterday afternoon to alleviate pain.

The young woman walked into the Hotel Normandie about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon and fell unconscious to the floor before reaching the clerk's desk. Later she was removed to the hospital.

In the young woman's purse was found a letter, written by her to a young man, in which she expressed her undying love for him, and intimated that there was some trouble between them. One sentence in the letter read: "I love you so much that I could not give up."

The young woman during her hysterical moments made some statements that when reported to Capt. James McDonnell, resulted in his telling Detective James Cotter to investigate. On the statements of the hospital physicians, made after examining the girl, the police discontinued their investigation.

"I'll wager that the girl hasn't taken poison of any sort, or any drugs," said the uncle of Arthur, or "Hart" Bentley, last night, discussing the melodramatic affair in which his nephew's name plays an important part. "It isn't the first time that the girl has made a bluff at suicide. She is a girl of excellent family, but she seems to be infatuated with the boy, and she was the means of driving him away from his home town. The two used to sing together in the church choir at Dresden, Ontario, where the parents of both live, and it was at that time that the romance began. Just how far the love affair went, I do not know, but Hart, I know, finally came to Detroit to get away from her, and he has now gone to Chicago for the same reason."

"Yesterday he got a letter from her, asking him to meet her, and today she telephoned to him. Shortly afterward he left for Chicago, and then I received word that the girl was in the hospital. But they will find out that she is just bluffing, as she has done before. She is a pretty girl and has wealthy relatives and I cannot explain her actions."
