WOOD ALCOHOL KILLS FOUR,

Three Men Are Dying at Cape Bauld Lighthouse From Poison.

QUEBEC, Sept. 8 .- According to the eport of the captain of a schooner which passed Cape Bauld three days ago, four men employed at a lighthouse, which is in course of construction there, died some day ago, after having drunk ome wood alcohol, and three others were dying. Instructions were immediately telegraphed to the captain of the steamer Aranmore, which was at Naashquan yesterday, to go there im-nediately and cross to Belle Isle to report as quickly as possible to the agent of the department of marine and fish-eries at Quebec. The latter does not expect any news before to-morrow night or Tuesday morning.
