RUSSELL SAGE LEFT ALL TO HIS WIFE

She Will Control All His Estate and Will Look After Any Charitable Bequests His Will May Contain--Estate Estimated at \$100,000,000.

NEW YORK, July 23--The funeral of Russell Sage, who died at his summer home in Lawrence, L. I., yesterday afternoon, will be held in the First Presbyterian church, Far Rockaway, of which Rev. R. G. Litch is pastor, tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock. The burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery, Troy.

RUSSIAN PARLIAMENT DOES NOT RECOGNIZE THE Czar's UKASE

Parliamentary Factions United in Opposition to Czar--Grave Trouble is Expected At Once--One Thousand Arrests Made Last Night.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 23--The government's midnight coup d'etat is already having the effect of uniting the dissident elements of the opposition, and it requires little persuasion to see that an era of repression and all which it entails will drive liberal and revolutionary alike to support the most desperate measures. It is already clear that resistance will be made. According to the latest advices from Viborg the members of parliament who fled to Finland intend to defy their sovereign. They are virtually refusing to recognize the decree of dissolution, a three hours' session being held last night under the presidency of Mourmoutoff, all the members of a regular session being observed.

THE COUNCIL WILL DECIDE TOMORROW

C. P. R.'s Offer for Land in West End to be Considered at a Special Meeting--What Both Sides Have to Say About it.

The common council will meet tomorrow to decide as to the offer of the C. P. R. to acquire the city's property back of Protection street, in order to extend their tracks and build a deep for immigrants. The committee appointed to deal with the matter have, it is understood, no formal recommendation to bring forward, but the general opinion is said to be in favor of selling and not leasing the property. Supt. Downie, of the C. P. R., when seen this morning, said the company would start work there at once if they could get the property at a reasonable figure. They would fill in the shore portion at once, using material from Bay Shore. The company expect to have the work finished in time for next season, if the property is acquired within a reasonable time. The overhead structure which it is proposed to build for the accommodation of immigrants might, however, have to stand over until the following season, but sufficient could be completed to materially facilitate the handling of freight.

FELL FROM STREET CAR TO HER DEATH

OTTAWA, Ont., July 23 (Special).--Mrs. Thomas Knight, 32 years of age, who resided with her husband and family at 167 McKay street, West Edinboro, while stepping from a street car late Saturday evening, near her home, fell and struck her head on the pavement. She was taken to the Protestant General Hospital, where she died this afternoon. She sustained a fracture of the skull.

CRASHED THROUGH BRIDGE

TORONTO, Ont., July 22 (Special).--The Great Northern express, running north from North Fort to Nelson, B. C., crashed through the bridge at Bonanza Canyon, six miles north of Kamloops, at about 5 o'clock Saturday evening near the international boundary. Among the dead are Judge W. B. Townsend, formerly of Rossland, B. C., with his wife and son-in-law, W. B. Smith, of Kaslo, B. C., and M. D. McKinnon, publisher of the Kamloops Herald. Several others are badly injured. A relief train went out from Rossland.

BIG BRIDGE ON FIRE

MONTREAL, July 23--(Special).--The C. P. R. bridge over the Magog river at Magog, Que., took fire in two places on Friday night and died in flames on the bridge of the system for thirty hours before repairs were completed. The damage was not great. The bridge is three hundred feet long and it is constructed of wood. The cause of the fire is unknown.

MANY DEAD IN TRAIN WRECK

CHARLOTTE, N. C. July 23--About 20 persons were killed and more than that number wounded as the result of a head-on collision between a through east-bound passenger train and an extra freight near Rockingham, N. C. four miles west of Hamlet, at 8:30 o'clock last evening. Many of the victims are said to be negroes.

BODY FOUND IN THE RIVER

FREDERICTON, July 23--(Special).--The body of Joseph Estman, colored, a float on the steamer Victoria was found floating in the river here at 1:30 today a short distance below the Star Line wharf. The ghostly find was made by Charles Foster and Ota Greig who were out in a boat. Coroner Weaver was called and decided to have the body buried in the Star Line wharf. The body was not on hand this morning. James McLean, an artist, saw what he supposed to be that he fell into the river while intoxicated. He was about forty-five years old and leaves a wife and three children.

POLICE COURT

THE TUFTS CASE

Hanington, Teed & Hanington, attorneys for the petitioning creditor in the matter of L. B. Tufts, have received word from Mr. Justice Landry that his honor, after carefully examining the affidavits filed by the petitioning creditor to obtain the warrant, has come to the conclusion that the facts disclosed in the affidavits were sufficient to establish the conditions required by the above-cited debtors' act entitling the petitioning creditor to a warrant. His honor further judged after reading the evidence adduced on the application for a supersedeas that no case has been made out entitling the debtor, L. B. Tufts, to a supersedeas. Mr. Justice's order therefore dismisses, with costs, the application for a supersedeas.

PROMINENT K. P. DEAD

WINDSHAVEN, Conn., July 23--Captain David B. Woodruff of Macon, Ga., past supreme chancellor of Knights of Pythias for the U. S., died here yesterday at the home of his sister, Mrs. Samuel Cornwall, whom he had been visiting for two weeks. Death following a nervous breakdown. He was 77 years of age, a veteran of the Confederate army and a well-known architect in the south.

When the witness got it, Nearin told him that he got it for his own use. A young man named McKewen was sitting in the back room at the time the witness found the flask. He took the flask with him and got it filled. He got one flask for a person in the house, who was ill.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 23--(Special).--Thomas Scarp, a heman, in the employ of the Ontario Transmission Company, fell over the cliff of the gorge at the foot of Eastwood street, yesterday afternoon.
