

LEAFS HAD A BAD WEEK FAILING TO LAND A VICTORY

Jim Jordan Continues to Bat Well—Injuries to Players Have Weakened the Team—Away for Rest of Month.

The Leafs have lost the last six games played, being the worst string of defeats so far experienced this season. The trip to Montreal was most disastrous, as four straight defeats to one club are hard to overcome. In the play of the four games the Leafs made 12 runs, 32 hits and 10 errors, while Montreal made 21 runs, 39 hits and 8 errors. In only one game did Montreal out-hit the Leafs, they doubled the score. In the game of June 4, the Toronto both out-batted and outfielded the Royals, but were unable to win.

The absence of Phelps, Bradley and O'Hara from the team at one time has been severely felt, as they were all going nicely. While Koehler is a good backstop, he has not had the experience of Phelps, which counts in games where scores are close. Bradley has been missed at third, the no particular fault can be found with Fitzpatrick's playing; the utility fielder works hard all the time and gives his best services to the club, but he is not the third baseman Bradley is.

Jordan is still the leading batter, his average now being .351. Delahanty is now well into the .300 class, having made a 16 point increase during the past week. A number of the regulars dropped somewhat, but no particular slumps are noticed.

Games will be played at the island on Monday and Tuesday, with Buffalo, and then the team goes on the road till July 10, barring two games with Buffalo here on July 1. This is the longest trip of the season to be taken by the Leafs and on it will depend their chances for the pennant. Should they return in as good a position as they are at present, Toronto should again have the honor of winning the Eastern League championship.

Carita Masteller Signs to Twirl For Railroad League in Cleveland—Has Some Curves.

CLEVELAND, June 10.—"Mother, give me the arnica bottle, quick. I'll never catch that girl again, no, never again. If she must do her spring training she'll have to get Sid Smith or Grover Land to catch her. I'm thru," and Pa Masteller flooded a swollen, puffed, red and sore left hand with the healing fluid and then pulled three fingers on his right hand back into place.

He had been catching—more correctly attempting to catch—the Walter Johnson-like assortment of benders, shoots, ins, outs and fast ones his daughter had been pegging at him. For Miss Carita Masteller is perhaps the best girl pitcher in Cleveland.

"Why, mother, I was only lobbing them up to dad. Just wait until I get into mid-season form," explained his militant daughter.

Never again for dad.

"And you will keep on waiting if you ever expect to make another target out of me," and Pa signed as he wound a yard or two of muslin around his much-battered left wrist.

"But, say, mother, she is some pitcher. I almost wish she was a boy, for she would be another Addie Joss, sure," added Masteller, for he is mighty proud of that girl of his and even more so of her pitching ability.

But Mrs. Masteller wasn't so enthusiastic. She would almost rather her girl wasn't a pitcher, but majority rules and that father and daughter form the majority.

Miss Masteller—and she is still in her "teens"—is going to pitch for the Wheeling & Lake Erie team of the Railroad League in an exhibition game at League Park against Bill Blackwood's team. She is also to twirl the first game in the regular championship season for the same team.

She is a bright, wide-awake girl, masculine as to walk and voice, but girlish in a good many ways. She loves baseball and says she would rather pitch than eat. She throws right-handed and has a world of speed. In fact, those who have caught her say that she has as much speed as most men. And she throws the ball with a good free motion—nothing like most women throw. She has all the curves that are ordinarily used and also has an underhanding in. Few men can throw this ball with any degree of success, but it is one of her most puzzling menders. Last season she pitched several games for the Spencerian Business College team.

"I have had all kinds of chances to become a professional," she said, in talking about her pitching career, "but amateur ball is good enough for me. I play baseball because I love it. Why do you know, last year I had dozens of offers to play pro ball."

CARL MORRIS, HEAVYWEIGHT

Most Likely Looking White Hope, According to His Pugilistic Mentor.

NEW YORK, June 7.—Joe Jeannette, the colored heavyweight who has been engaged to teach Carl Morris, the original "White Hope," a few things about boxing, has been training Morris for several weeks in Oklahoma, returned to his native city yesterday.

"I think Carl Morris is the most likely looking white heavyweight in the world today," said Jeannette. "He is a natural fighter, and has a great right hand, in which he packs a terrific wallop. He has the making of a great fighter. In fact, of all the 'white hopes' I have been engaged to teach, he is the best. I have had lots of experience in that line. This fellow, Morris, is about the most promising. He is very quick to learn things, and once he is told something, or given a pointer, he never forgets it."

"I predict that Morris will beat Jim Flynn when they meet at Tulsa on July 4. They are scheduled to fight fifteen rounds, but I don't think the contest will last that long. This fellow, Morris, has improved wonderfully. His trainer, Con Kelly, who brought out Joe Jeannette, has been developing him and getting him into the ring. When he was here he weighed 215 pounds. Now he weighs 240 pounds, and that is just about the weight at which he ought to fight."

"I've been training with him for five weeks now, and I think he's about as good a fighter as I have ever seen. He loves to fight, and really wants to get a crack at the hard ones. I rarely make predictions, but here's one that I will make: Morris will beat Flynn when they meet at Tulsa on July 4."

Jeannette will return to Oklahoma next week with his manager, Dan McFadden. He came to New York because he was homesick.

Amalfi, Star Charter, and Powderman are among the original entries, but the field is likely to be from the horses whose pedigrees are quoted.

The Hamilton Derby is the same dis-

tance as the O. J. C. King's Plate, a mile and a quarter, and is for \$2500, guaranteed. It will be the feature and fifth race of next Saturday's card.

A number of stables have already arrived including those of A. Simons, Chas. Boyle, Al. Weston and the Valley Farm.

The other feature races are: Monday, 16th, Wentworth Plate; Tuesday, Dominion Plate; Wednesday, Barton Steeplechase; Thursday, Coronation Day, the Coronation Day Handicap with \$1000 added to the stake, one mile on the turf course; Friday, Grant Spring Brewery Stakes; Saturday, 24th, closing day, National Handicap, \$1500 added.

Speaking to The World of the approaching meeting Secretary London said: "We have made a great many improvements which, I think will meet with the approval of the public. We look for a most successful meeting and more horses than we can accommodate. The Derby, the feature of the opening day, promises to be an unusually attractive race this year. The usually starters include the best 3-year-olds in America."

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Matt Wells Will Be Kept Very Busy

English Lightweight Will Get Crack At All the Good American Mitt Artists.

The services of Mat Wells, the British lightweight champion, are in demand, and it is probable that he will remain on this continent for some time to come. With prospective opponents in K. O. Brown, Packy McFarland, Ad Wolgast, Owen Moran, Freddie Welsh and Jack Britton, Wells realizes that he can be kept extremely busy on this side of the Atlantic; also that there is a better chance to reap a financial harvest here than in England. Wells is a modest fellow, almost shy, it may be said. He doesn't say much on any subject, but he knows how to fight. He is not a showy boxer like McFarland or Welsh, but is very much on the order of Wolgast—a persistent, boring, hard hitter, who has plenty of stamina to keep going an unlimited length of time.

In build Wells is powerfully constructed. His legs are short and sturdy, his waist normal and the upper part of his body of unusual proportions. His chest and back are broad, indicating great lung power, his arms are long and heavily muscled, his neck is thick and his round head nestles low between the shoulders. Wells has natural fighting instinct. He cannot keep away from an opponent by using his feet. He doesn't move about to any great extent, but he is a splendid judge of distance and is a past master in dodging and ducking. Ability to make an antagonist miss is a winning quality and Wells has this trick down as fine as silk. In attack he shows a

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
