

TAUGHT SCHOOL FOR MORE THAN FIFTY-FIVE YEARS

M. A. Wall, of Botsford, Westmorland County, Probably Has Longer Teaching Career Than Any Other Teacher in the Province--Taught in St. John for 25 Years.

(Sackville Post.) As my career as an instructor of youth is somewhat chequered I thought I would give to the public through your valuable paper a brief outline of my ups and downs among some of the schools of New Brunswick, hoping it may be of interest to the friends of education in this province. I finished my education in old Sackville Academy in its early days when it was in its infancy. I recollect among the pupils that attended at that time, the present Chief Justice Tuck, Ex-Governor Metcalf and many others who have distinguished themselves. I attended the training school in St. John obtained a first class home, took a school at Lancaster, St. John, at the age of nineteen and taught in that school district 25 years, thus teaching two generations, or in other words children and their children. When Superior schools were established in the province it became the Lancaster superior school, and continued as such while I remained there. No doubt there are many now engaged in their respective callings, such as doctors, lawyers, merchants, teachers, legislators, politicians, who remember their Alma Mater. Names of schools and length of time taught in each: Lancaster, St. John, 25 years; Jerusalem, Queens County, 3 years; Caraquet, Gloucester Co. 12 year; Midgie, Westmorland Co. 3 years; Jolicoeur, Westmorland Co. 6 years; Upper Cape, Westmorland Co. 4 years; Baie Verte Road, West. Co. 2 years; Baie Verte, West. Co. 2 years; Cape Spear, West. Co. 2 years; Bayville, West. Co. 6 years; Frosty Hollow, West. Co. 1 year; Fair View, West. Co. 12 year; Lost through sickness, etc. 3 years. This shows that I have been 58 years in the school service during that time I lost 2 years and actually taught 55 years, teaching in one place 25 years. If there is any teacher who can beat that record now is his opportunity. Let him come to the front. Finally I wish to say a few words concerning myself. I have been unfortunate in my financial affairs. I was insured in 2 different companies, Fairmount Mutual and Mass. B. A. They both failed and all the money put into them by me for my support in old age went to the wind. I also lost in other ways, so that I am now a sick and helpless old teacher, depending on my friends. I was surprised when I received a letter a few days ago containing a handsome present in cash and stating that he had attended the Lancaster Superior School when a boy for four years and that I was his teacher. He is now a flourishing business man in St. John, and I shall never forget his kindness and generosity. This letter has led me to write this hoping that others may follow his example, and other noble minded men may contribute to their abundance. I may be that some of my former pupils may be inspired on reading this with a like generosity and make a similar donation which will be thankfully received and acknowledged. There should be a fund for broken down teachers, who have worn themselves out in the profession and the province is indebted to those Pioneers of Education who labored at starvation salaries that the children of this country might be educated.
