**Canadian News Notes**  
Chatham, N. B., May 13—Charges of second offences in violation of the Scott act have been laid against J. D. Johnston, John White, J. D. Lahar, and R. Flanagan. The cases will be heard on Wednesday. The penalty for a second offence is a fine of \$100 and for a third offence two months in jail.

**EX-GOVERNOR ARRESTED ON SMUGGLING CHARGE**

New York, May 14—Frank W. Rollins, formerly governor of New Hampshire and now one of the most prominent bankers in Boston, and his son, Douglas, twenty-five years old, were arrested here yesterday after their arrival from Europe on board the Lusitania, in the case of smuggling charged with conspiring to defraud the government in attempting to smuggle jewelry and dutiable articles of clothing through the customs.

**SIR WILFRID'S PLANS FOR TOUR OF WEST**

Ottawa, May 13—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's political tour of western Canada will begin during the first week in July and will last sixty days, during which the premier will visit all the important centres in the west, from Port Arthur to Prince Rupert. The exact itinerary has not yet been arranged for the date, but it is settled that Sir Wilfrid, accompanied by Hon. Geo. F. Graham, E. M. MacDonald, M. P., and J. P. Parlee, M. P., chief Liberal whip, will leave Ottawa July 7 or 8, speaking the following day at Port Arthur or Port William.
