

GENTENARY IS WELL OBSERVED

Saint John Delegates Return After Meetings on P. E. I.

Hundredth Anniversary of the W. M. S. in Canada—Amalgamation on March 31.

The 100th anniversary of the first Women's Missionary Society formed in Canada was commemorated at the 49th annual meeting of the Women's Missionary Society of the Maritime Provinces or eastern division of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (now the United Church) held in Malpeque, P. E. I., this week and the Saint John delegates who returned last evening from the convention were greatly interested by the ceremonies and by the reports presented at the meeting. Although Malpeque is a small village the delegates from all parts of the Maritime Provinces found abundant hospitality in the comfortable homes in the neighborhood.

The dedicatory prayer was offered by Mrs. L. M. McLean. Reports were sent by Miss Carmichael and Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Morton, Trinidad.

GREETINGS.

Rev. Dr. Pidgeon, president of the United Church of Canada, sent greetings. Mrs. A. N. Gillis gave an address of welcome. The corresponding secretary reported: Presbyterials, 10; auxiliaries, 374; members, 9,037; average attendance, 3,429; new members this year, 546; life members, 244; home helpers, 1,065; copies of Message taken, 6,161; mission boxes and parcels, 81. The treasurer's report showed receipts for foreign missions \$41,375.13, and receipts for home missions, \$15,138.91.

In the afternoon representatives spoke for sister societies. Mrs. J. W. Flewelling, Saint John, representing Congregationalist W. M. S. Board; Mrs. Westmorland, of Vernon, P. E. I., from N. B. and P. E. I. Branch of Methodist W. M. S.; Mrs. J. C. Purdy, Amherst, for Nova Scotia Branch of Methodist W. M. S.; and Mrs. Janet MacGillivray, president of Presbyterian W. M. S. (western division).

A telegram of greetings was received from Mrs. A. W. Thomson, St. Catharines, Ont. Mrs. R. A. Jamieson, Saint John, replied to the greetings including that of Mrs. Gillis. Mrs. Bruce, the secretary for Korea, and Mrs. Tombs, secretary for Trinidad and Miss Rogers, of Korea, read their reports.

Mrs. O'Brien read the address sent by Mrs. Forbes, Miss Archibald, of Trinidad, and Miss Rogers, of Korea, spoke of their work.

HISTORY READ.

In the evening the church was crowded. A splendid choir rendered beautiful music. Rev. A. N. Gillis presided. Rev. Christopher Momo, D.D., offered prayer and Rev. W. L. Green read the scriptures.

Rev. A. N. Gillis gave a history of the organization of the first W. M. S. organized in Canada—"The Female Society for the Propagation of the Gospel"—founded in 1825.

Mrs. Nell MacLeod, president of P. E. I. presbyterial, unveiled a tablet to the memory of these pioneer missionary workers—seven in number. Representatives of P. E. I. Presbyterial sent greetings by Rev. George Christie, Alberton. Mr. Christie spoke of the new paper for the Maritime Provinces taking the place of The Wesleyan, to be called The United Churchman. There is to be a column put at the disposal of the W. M. S. and contributions of interest are invited.

Rev. A. F. Robb, just returned from Korea, gave a splendid address. He represented the 850 missionaries of the United Church of Canada. He brought congratulations to Malpeque and to the W. M. S. and on accepting the budget for the coming year. Rev. F. M. Auld, M.D., of Hanan, brought greetings for the F. M. Board from Hanan missionaries. He spoke of "The Women and Children of China."

A recommendation was passed in the afternoon that the books be not closed until March 31, when the amalgamation of the uniting W. M. S. will take place. It was enthusiastically decided to endeavor to raise what still remains on the budget and 50 per cent more before March 31, 1926. The greatest spirit of optimism marked the meetings.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 18.—A formal protest of the election of Councillor Wasson, G. B. R. in the Parish of Bright has been made by Albert P. Jewett. Messrs. LONDON, Ont., Sept. 18.—Herbert G. Brewer, 24-year-old Bank of Montreal teller, pleaded guilty before Magistrate Maguire in London police court this morning to the charge of theft of more than \$7,000 from a London branch in which he was employed. He was remanded to jail until Monday for sentence.

Brewer, whose home is in New Brunswick, was arrested more than a month ago.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—Mrs. Gladys M. Vogt, known on the stage as Junia Clark, filed suit for divorce today against John G. Vogt, son of F. G. Vogt, meat packer of Philadelphia. She charged cruelty. Her attorney said a pre-nuptial agreement gave Mrs. Vogt one-half of a \$50,000 trust fund provided she was still married to Vogt Jan. 1, 1927. By bringing the suit, the attorney said, she loses all claim to the trust.

CHANGES ON SUBURBAN SERVICE—CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.

Canadian Pacific have announced the following changes in service, which will be of interest to suburbanites along the line of Canadian Pacific Railway: Early morning suburban, which arrives Saint John 7.45 a. m., will make last trip September 26. Noon suburban, which leaves Saint John 9.15 a. m., and returning, arriving in Saint John 11.50 a. m., will make last trip September 12. Afternoon suburban, leaving Saint John 1.15 p. m., will make last trip September 7, and will run Saturdays only up to and including October 31. Evening suburban, arriving Saint John 5.15 p. m., will make last trip September 26, but will run on Saturdays, September 12 and 19. Fredericton train which leaves at 6.15 p. m. will continue on this time up to and including September 26, after which it will leave at 5.15 p. m. Evening suburban arriving Saint John 5.15 p. m. will make last daily trip September 12, but will run on Saturdays only up to and including October 31, and will arrive Saint John 8.10 p. m. after daylight time ceases September 26. Late outward suburban leaving Saint John 10.15 p. m. will make last trip September 12, and will run Saturday only, September 19 and 26. Sunday trains, numbers 119 and 120, to and from Fredericton, will make last trip September 20. On and after September 14, trains 101 and 102 will stop on flag signal at Onondaga and Kesteven, daily except Saturday and Sunday, until September 26. Last evening connection from Saint John to St. Andrews September 18. Last morning train from St. Andrews September 19. 8-10-12-14-20

Oil Company's New Pipe Line Is Ready

The new cargo landing facilities of the Imperial Oil Company have been completed and will be used by the next tanker making port for this company's plant at the oil pier. They consist of a piling pier just off the company's plant and a pipe line to the land tanks where the oil is stored. The pier is some distance off shore on the Courtenay Bay side of the oil plant. The depth of water on the average is about 22 feet and is 20 feet at low tide, giving draught enough for any tankers brought here. The pipe-line is about 1,500 feet in length and consists of two six-inch pipes running from the shore tanks along the C. N. R. right-of-way to Broad street and thence to the pier.
