BRILLIANCY MARKS AUTUMN WEDDING IN CENTENARY CHURCH

A wedding which has been anticipated with interest on account of the prominence of the bride's family took place in Centenary United church last evening at 6:30 o'clock, when Helen Louise, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rupert Ernest Smith, became the wife of Dr. Grant Errol Harper, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Harper, of Waterloo, Ont. Rev. Robert G. Fulton officiated.

The church was beautifully decorated with palms, ferns and white chrysanthemums and, as the invitations numbered over 150, was crowded with waiting guests and friends.

Promptly at the appointed hour, to the strains of the wedding hymn, "The Voice That Breathed O'er Eden," the bride entered the church, with her father, who gave her in marriage, and was preceded by the full vested choir and the wedding party.

BRIDE'S GOWN.

Her gown was of ivory duchess satin, embroidered with rhinestones and pearls. The train of shimmering satin, lined with shirred white georgette, was embroidered in similar design to her dress, and hung from her shoulders. Her veil of bridal tulle, worn over her face, was arranged in cap effect from a coronet of rose point lace and finished at the sides with orange blossoms. It fell in folds to the full length of the train. She carried a magnificent shower bouquet of Ophelia roses and lilies of the valley.

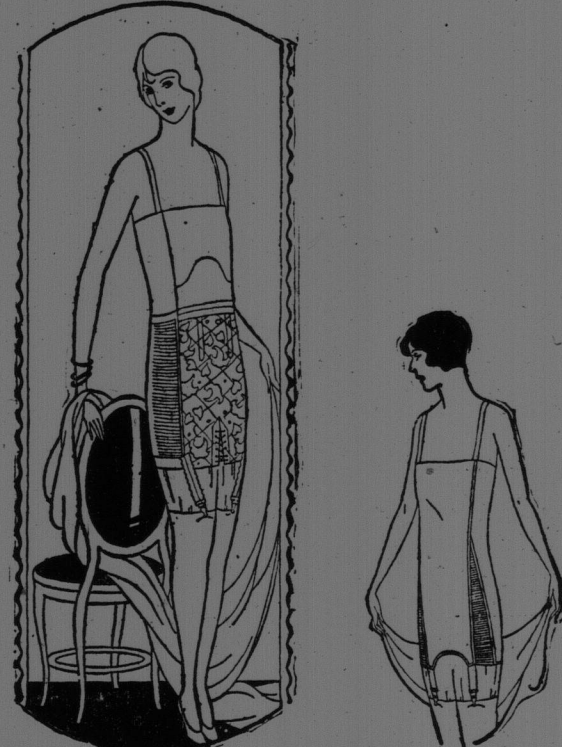

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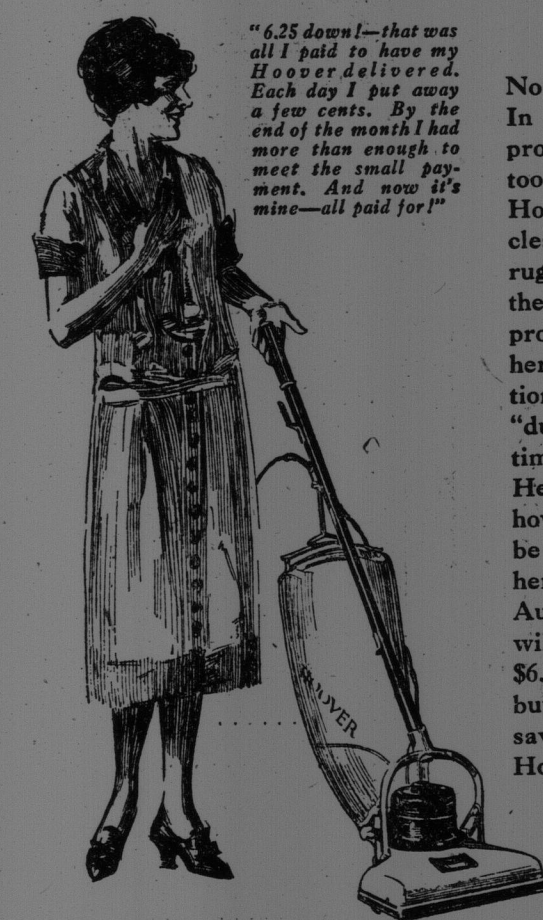
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
