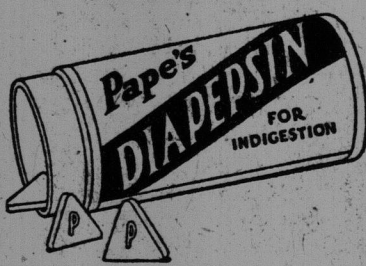

DRASTIC CURB PLANNED ON ALL IMPORTS BY MAILS

U. S. Demands Right to Open Sealed Packages and Seize All Fraudulent Goods.

Washington, Oct. 3.—The Treasury and Postoffice departments have announced drastic new joint regulations governing the importation of merchandise through the mails designed to prevent such packages from escaping tariff duties.

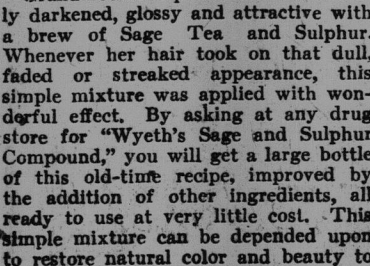
Among the rules, which will become effective November 1, is provision that all sealed packages will be returned to the country of origin unless they bear endorsement that the seal may be broken for customs examination. Shipments "tainted with fraud" are to be confiscated.

Packages must contain an accurate invoice of the contents and, if the articles are intended for resale, definite statements of their value must be included.

Revision of the regulations was made necessary, a statement said, by the "enormous increase" in imports coming by mail, and particularly by parcels post, and consequent delays under the present rules at important ports.

POLICE VAINLY SEARCH HOUSE OF DAVID FOR "KING"

Invasion of Temple at Dawn, Seeking Purnell and Traps for Fraternity

Benton Harbor, Mich., Oct. 3.—State police, aided by Berrien County deputies, invaded the House of David Colony here in a fruitless search for Benjamin Purnell, missing head of the cult, sought on a warrant charging him with a statutory crime.

The raiding party consisted of more than fifty state police, deputy sheriffs and newspaper men. They reached the colony before daylight after throwing a cordon about the place and posting guards on all highways leading to it.

They trooped through the halls and corridors of Shiloh House, the temple home of Purnell. They poked into basement and attic, seeking subterranean tunnels, sealed rooms and secret passages through which Purnell's acolytes charged he flitted when officers of the law sought him. No trace of mysterious passages or tunnels was discovered. There was no sign of "King" Benjamin.

SEIZE 8 CARS OF HAIR TONIC

Chicago Dry Agents Say Shipment From Here is Moonshine.

Chicago, Oct. 3.—Eight carloads of "hair tonic," which prohibition agents claim is worth \$500,000 in the moonshine market, were seized today on the New York Central tracks at Taylor street.

The federal men declared the shipment was alcohol, slightly colored to give it a reddish tinge. It was labeled "Habele Adaco Hair Tonic" and was consigned by the Allied Drug & Chemical Company of New York, to the same company here in care of R. Weller, 448 North La Salle street.

According to the prohibition officers this is the largest shipment of alcohol which has ever been seized in Chicago. The eight carloads contained 24,000 cases. Each case contained one and one-half gallons.

Lacking space to store the shipment, armed federal guards were placed about the cars. Authorities believe that it was the intention of Chicago boot-leggers to treat the "hair tonic" with a chemical converting it into moonshine. An attempt to recongnize the eighth car, after the first seven had been seized, was frustrated by the prohibition agents. It was found on the tracks of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE

Base Burners— Fill stove in the same manner as with anthracite. When well ignited keep dampers set for less draft than with coal.

Ash will form in a thick clinker on the grate, but not sticking to it. Break with poker and remove through fire door two or three times per week. It will seldom be found necessary to shake the grate.

Furnaces— Maintain a thick bed of fuel and low draft after fire is well started. Remove clinker same as from base-burner.
