The locals require one more victory to win the pennant and the right to meet the Michigan-Ontario champions in the state inter-league series.



Ottawa, Sept. 20.—Ottawa boxers have been invited to compete in what is expected to be the greatest international boxing tournament ever staged in the Dominion, to be held under A. A. U. of C. auspices in Toronto on October 18 and 20. The Toronto branch has particularly asked for Eddy Spittal, local welterweight champion, and Harry Menchise, 115 pound champion.
