
Nurse Testifies Patient was Rolled in Many Layers of Wool and Flannel.

New York, May 29.-Miss Annie tham, who for fourteen years Cunningham, who for fourteen years until 1918 nursed Miss Emily Howland Bourne, was a witness before Surrogate Foley and a jury in a suit brought by Miss Bourne's niece, Mrs. Helen A. P. Merriman of Providence, to set aside the will of Miss Bourne leaving the bulk of her \$1,000,000 to another niece, Mr. Emily Michler of Greenwich, Conn. 
