## WAVE OF CRIME IN SOUTHERN IRELAND

Shootings, Kidnappings, Burglaries, Mail Robberies.

Appeal to the People—  
British Authority is With-  
drawn and New Free State  
Government Has Not As-  
serted Itself.

(Special Cable to the N. Y. Times and  
Montreal Gazette.)

London, Jan. 28. — The Freeman's  
Journal and other Irish newspapers  
which cannot be accused of English sym-  
pathies are growing alarmed at the dis-  
order which is prevalent in some parts  
of the Irish Free State. They are mak-  
ing earnest appeals to their countrymen  
to remember that now the good name  
of Ireland is at stake and not the hated  
suzerainty against which the offences are  
now being committed.

The position is, indeed, a very diffi-  
cult one. Ireland is in a state of transi-  
tion. The British authority is in theory  
withdrawn, but the Irish provisional  
government has not yet had time to es-  
tablish itself in the more distant dis-  
tricts. Moreover, it is compelled to work  
through the very courts and officials  
whom not so many months ago it was  
enough as the instruments of British  
rule. It has, it is true, formally  
asked them over and promised that they  
are now part and parcel of the new  
state, but it is not surprising that one  
of its violent supporters are not re-  
pared to accept so suddenly an au-  
thority they were lately encouraged to re-  
ject.

From the reports of serious crimes re-  
ceived at Dublin Castle there is fear that  
any which are connected with the  
seizure of automobiles and bicycles have  
specially sinister meaning. It may be  
through these can be proved, that  
the denoted steady preparation on the  
part of the extreme Republicans for a  
renewal of warfare. The time may come  
when the Republicans under the lead-  
ership of Eamon de Valera and O'Donnell  
may be using force and intimidation to  
enforce the moderate followers of Grif-  
fin and Collins. Some of the Republi-  
cans, it is said, are already gathering all  
modern transport against an outbreak  
of hostilities.

### Eight Crimes in a Week

Whatever the reason the official  
statistics show deplorable lawlessness in  
the South of Ireland. Below a line  
drawn from Clontarf to Wicklow in  
the week of January 21 to 27, no less than  
eight crimes of importance were re-  
corded by Dublin Castle as having oc-  
curred in the Free State.

Moreover when the localities affected  
are noted the seriousness of the situa-  
tion becomes more apparent. Large dis-  
tricts are crime free. About Dublin and  
the neighboring counties the law is well  
maintained—the theft of £250 from a  
clerk of Dublin county council at  
Kilmainham is a crime that might have  
occurred anywhere. In the same way  
Limerick, Limerick and a number of  
other counties in the centre were order-  
ly enough, and in the far west Galway  
went its way peacefully and Mayo had  
only one or two scattered outrages.

In the south and southwest, in Cork,  
Limerick and Tipperary that the  
hands of the law seem light, and cer-  
tain centres like Fermoy and Thurles af-  
fect again and again in the returns.

Some of the outrages speak of par-  
tisan passions still unallayed. At  
Thurles the house of a Justice of the  
peace has been damaged. In the environs  
of the city of Waterford the orchard of  
a Justice of the peace has been cut down.  
At Enniscorthy a party of police has been  
attacked and one of them wounded. At  
Kilmainham, County Kerry, the members  
of the Irish Republican Army looked on  
while a woman was ill-treated for refus-  
ing to attend a Sinn Féin court. At  
Wintford, County Mayo, a constable was  
killed by his house, knocked down and  
killed by five or six men.

Kidnappings still occur. A saloon-  
keeper at Rathfriland, County Limerick,  
saw a woman being carried off by a man  
and a woman. At Fermoy Crown Soli-  
er Carroll was kidnapped to prevent him
