Ambermen's Car Overtaken on River Road - More Changes in the Fredericton Hospital.

POST PERMANENT RATING. Postmaster J. S. Flagler announced this afternoon that J. W. Hickey and George B. Drake had been appointed to the permanent staff of letter carriers. Both are returned men and have been temporary employees of the department for some months. Their appointment was made possible by two vacancies in the permanent staff.

MANY WRITING THE EXAMS HERE. Between 210 and 220 students are writing the examinations for normal entrance high school leaving, university matriculation and superior teachers licenses here. Supervisors are Inspector S. A. Worrell, Principals A. L. Dylke, R. B. Egan, J. F. Owens, H. C. Rieker and W. J. Shea and Miss Ida Keagin. The order of examinations is as follows: Tuesday morning, British and Canadian history for N. S. entrance and superior license and English literature for matriculation and H. S. leaving; Tuesday afternoon, Algebra for N. S. entrance, Latin for superior license, algebra and arithmetic for matriculation and arithmetic and book-keeping for H. S. leaving.

Wednesday morning, arithmetic, nature study and agriculture for N. S. entrance and superior license, Latin and chemistry for matriculation and H. S. leaving, optional for the latter. Wednesday afternoon English grammar for all.

Thursday morning, geometry and geography for N. S. entrance and superior license, geometry and botany for matriculation and H. S. leaving. Thursday afternoon, writing and drawing and French (optional) for N. S. entrance and superior license and history and geography for matriculation and H. S. leaving. Friday morning, Greek or French for matriculation and optional French for H. S. leaving.

Countess Captured. London, July 4. - Three more buildings in Sackville street, Dublin, were occupied by the Free State forces this afternoon after the structures had been heavily peppered with machine gun fire, says the Evening News despatch.

It is unofficially reported, adds the message, that Countess Markievicz and a few women snappers have been captured, their ammunition having run out.

MONTREAL STOCK EXCHANGE. Montreal, July 4. - Trading on the local stock market this morning was brisk and many fractional changes in prices were registered. The preferred of Atlantic Sugar was down a half point at 86. Toronto Railway sold a quarter weaker at 79.14. Shawinigan advanced a half to 104.2. Of the papers, Price Bros. was unchanged at 89 and the preferred stock of Spanish River registered a half point gain at 93.

RICH IN VITAMINES FREE STATERS MAKE MORE GAINS. Steadily Near Completion of Defeat of Insurgents. Reported and Denied That Ulsterites Joined Irregulars on Border in Attack on the Regulars.

Dublin, July 4. - The enveloping movement of the Free State forces in the Sackville street area is complete, and the final defeat of the rebels is in sight, says a communication issued from general headquarters in the Beggar Bush Barracks at three o'clock this morning.

The insurgents have been driven out of their positions in Earl street, so that their comrades in the Greenham Hotel and adjoining buildings in Sackville street are entirely surrounded.

Thirty-two rebels were captured when the national troops rushed the Earl street positions and the Catholic Club, opposite the Greenham Hotel. The Y. M. C. A. building in Sackville street, which had been occupied by insurgents, was burnt during the night following an attack by the Free Staters.

Monday's casualties consisted of three killed and twenty-seven wounded. The government forces now hold all the positions dominating the buildings in Sackville street occupied by the rebels. Barricades at the Lifey Bridges and the centre of the city were being reinforced from escaping or reinforcements from reaching them.

Fighting in Silgo. Belfast, July 4. - Passengers arriving in Enniskillen from Silgo say there was fierce fighting there last night between the Free Staters and Republicans. The police barracks were burned and the post office wrecked. At Colson's the rebels were driven out of their positions. Protestants were burned.

IRREGULARS AND ULSTERITES IN A JOINT ATTACK. Dublin, July 4. - The Glenfarm Barracks at Lutrum near the Ulster border, held by national army troops, was attacked simultaneously by Irish irregulars and Ulster specials from different positions. "The small garrison stubbornly resisted," says an official bulletin, "but eventually was forced to yield to the combined forces."

The wound suffered by Alderman Monahan, mayor of Drogheda, who was shot in the neck yesterday, is reported not of a serious nature.

The official announcement of the capture of Glenfarm Barracks, an Irish Free State position, the first indication of co-operation between the southern Irish irregulars, and the Ulster forces, which there is any likelihood of Ulster rebels joining the insurgents against the Free State forces has not been indicated. Since the Glenfarm Barracks are situated near the Ulster border, it is possible that Ulster may consider their being held by any armed troops an infringement upon the recent agreement between the Free State and the British government, providing for a neutral zone five miles wide along the Ulster-Free State boundary.

Belfast, July 4. - The Ulster constabulary headquarters this afternoon stated that the report of Ulster specials participating with Irish irregulars in the capture of Glenfarm Barracks was absolutely untrue.

London, July 4. - The Evening News says several fighting aircraft, bearing the markings of the Irish Free State - green, white and red circles - were seen to belong to the Free State forces. The Crovdon airbase today for the "Dublin front." The first machine was a Bristol fighter.

Dublin, July 4. - The Hotel Hamman, one of the positions held by the Free State forces, was burnt about one o'clock this afternoon. The firemen were unable to reach the building owing to heavy gunfire. At two o'clock the British forces were attacking the positions of the irregulars from both front and rear and their surrender was expected any time.

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BEEN MISSING SINCE MONDAY

Some Fears That Nicholas Osborne Has Been Drowned in Miramichi River.

(Special to The Times.) Newcastle, July 4. - Search is being carried on for Nicholas Osborne, conductor of the Fredericton freight, who was last seen on Monday morning at two o'clock by two brakemen on the ferry wharf here. He then wore a blue suit with light cap. Osborne is forty-five years of age and has a wife and two children in Marysville. The Miramichi river will be dragged, as there is a fear that he has fallen in and been drowned.

Winnipeg, July 4. - (Canadian Press) - With the close of what a political writer calls a "badly failed campaign," only two weeks away, the 221,374 persons whose names are on the Manitoba voters lists are displaying no lively interest in the provincial election. Fifty-three members of the legislature are to be elected on July 18 and two others will be chosen in deferred elections in The Pas and Rupert's Land, the date is not yet fixed.

Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, represented The Pas in the last house and probably will be a candidate once more.

There are now close to 150 candidates in the field, and this list will be enlarged before the official nominations on next Saturday. There will be more than forty candidates in Winnipeg where ten members are to be elected by proportional representation, fairly evenly divided among Liberals, Conservatives, Progressives (allied with the United Farmers) and Labor, with few independent candidates. The chosen ten are likely to include representatives of all the parties.
