Re Wills-Dempsey Bout.

Jack Dempsey has signed to box Harry Wills. Some time in the more or less hazy future and at some place yet to be selected the world's heavyweight champion will defend his title against the negro challenger. But when? That is the question which every boxing fan is asking. The articles are extremely indefinite. It is quite true that the conditions which surround this match prevent the articles from being very specific as to time and place. There was nothing to prevent the clause governing bids for the match being made specific.

Instead of merely stating "bids for the holding of such contest from promoters must be submitted to all the parties hereto and must be satisfactory to all" and the additional clause, "this contest must be held within a period of sixty days from acceptance by the parties hereto of the successful bid for such contest," it would have been far more businesslike had a time limit been set for the receiving of bids. As the situation now stands Dempsey and Wills have agreed to fight sixty days after a bid has been accepted. An offer could be accepted next month, but then an offer might not be accepted until the middle of next year. There is nothing to prevent such delay. In short, study of the articles reveals the fact that Dempsey and Wills have signed a piece of paper that amounts to little more than a piece of paper. No forfeits have been put up.

The New York State Athletic Commission late in June notified Dempsey that he must either accept or decline Wills's challenge on or before July 10. Dempsey has complied with this demand. He has admittedly avoided a clash with the boxing salons. And he has done so without obligating himself to anything specific. The insertion of the clause "it is hereby mutually agreed that either Jack Dempsey or Harry Wills may take part in any bout during the continuance of this contract," is proof that both principals realize that the bout will not be held before next year.

Rioxx Lasts Two Rounds.

Montreal, July 18—Elmer Rioxx, the French-Canadian giant, regarded as a possible Quebec province challenger for the world's heavyweight boxing championship, came up against Jack Dempsey, holder of the title, in what was scheduled to be a four-round bout at the Mount Royal arena here tonight. At the conclusion of the second round he quit, entirely convinced that he is no match for the champion.

Greb Suspended.

New York, July 19—Harry Greb of Pittsburgh, lightweight champion, and his manager, George Engle, have been definitely suspended by the New York Boxing Commission from further participation in bouts in this state, because Greb has not signed a contract to box Dave Rosenberg, as he was directed to do.

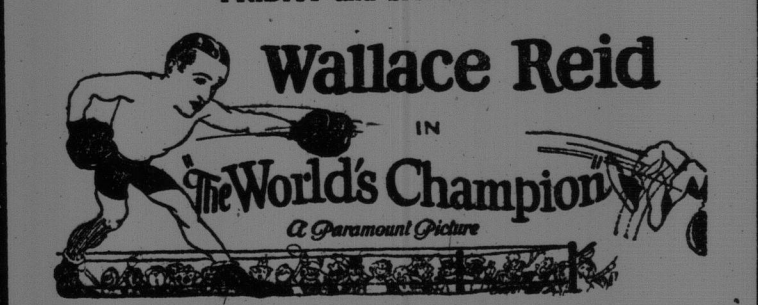


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is to be at thirty-six holes medal play.

Each member club of the New Jersey State Golf Association is invited to enter a team of not more than four caddies. There will be no age limit, but only caddies will be permitted to play. Caddies or professionals' assistants are excluded. All entries must be made through either the secretary of the club or through the chairman of the club's caddie welfare committee. There will be no entrance fee.

Entries will close at noon Tuesday, August 15, and should be sent in by the club secretary or by the chairman of the caddie welfare committee to H. Y. Barrow, 47 West street, New York City.

Qualifying tournaments to select the four caddies who are to represent each club should be held as soon as possible.

WANT PART CREDIT "THREE MUSKETEERS"

Heirs of Writer Dispute Authorship By Dumas.

Paris, July 18—French literary circles are stirred over the court proceedings in which the heirs of a comparatively unknown author, Alexandre Maquet, are claiming recognition for a share in the writing of the "Three Musketeers," generally credited to Alexandre Dumas.

Maquet's family demand that the name of Auguste Maquet henceforth figure on the cover with that of Alexandre Dumas and that the family shall benefit from a part of the revenue from the sales of the book.

That Dumas was not alone responsible for the world famous book was brought to public notice some time ago in a book published by Gustave Simon, entitled the "Story of a Collaboration," in which he described the individual work of both men in the writing of the "Three Musketeers" and from which it would appear that Maquet not only wrote the greatest part of it, but the finest.

If the court recognizes the claim put forward by Maquet's relatives, it will have to assess the amount of the revenue to which the family is entitled for the past twenty-four years.

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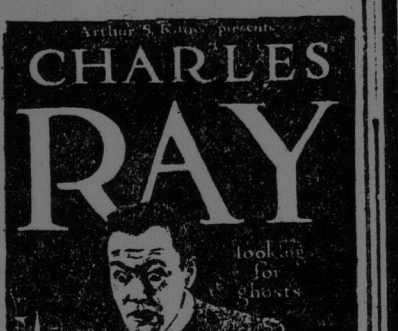
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
