

MUNICH HEARS THE HEAVY GUNS

Red Guards Reported Plundering: People in Misery; Promise of Fighting in Carinthia

Berne, May 2—Artillery fire of the German government troops is audible in Munich and is constantly creeping nearer, according to private advices from that city. The government troops hold all the important points about Munich and are masters of the railroad communication in that region.

The Red Guards are reported to be demoralized and to be plundering the banks. The Communists are reported threatening to massacre the bourgeoisie when the government forces attack the city. The misery of the people is said to have reached an unbearable point.

Geneva, May 2—The government of Carinthia has ordered the mobilization of twenty military classes to arrest the invasion of German-Austria by the

Jugo-Slavs, according to a despatch received at Berne from a reliable source. Jugo-Slavs are reported to be attacking on a fifty-mile front for the purpose of seizing Klagenfurt, the capital of Carinthia, and Villach, from which they are now only fifteen miles distant. Vienna is said to be preparing to aid the Carinthian troops, and the Allies are seeking to settle the conflict.

SYLVIA PANKHURST ARRESTED FOR MAY DAY ACTIVITY

London, May 2—(By the Associated Press)—May Day in England was closed peacefully. There were processions by Laborites and meetings in various industrial centres in London and also a big parade of Socialists through the west end to Hyde Park, where many speeches were delivered.

The only untoward demonstration of the day was when Sylvia Pankhurst, a militant suffragette, and a score of women supporters tried to force an entrance into the House of Commons. The police prevented their entry and Miss Pankhurst was arrested.

Roscoe Searles, winner of the two 150-mile races of the season on the Ascot Park Speedway, Los Angeles, will not drive his Roamer in the Indianapolis 500-mile Liberty Sweepstakes.

BOLSHEVIKI SALUTE WAS APPLAUSE AT A TORONTO MEETING

Some 4,000 Workers Demand "Hands of Russia"—Red Badges Worn by Many

Toronto, May 2—"Hands off Russia" was the gist of a resolution passed at a May Day meeting of about 4,000 workers last night in the Arena, and yesterday afternoon practically the same gathering passed a resolution in the same building calling for the immediate release of all political prisoners in Canada. At both meetings red badges were worn by the majority, and foreign Socialists seemed to predominate.

The "hands off Russia" resolution called upon the Allied governments immediately to take steps to withdraw their troops from Russia and protested against the furnishing of war materials and finances to the reactionary commanders in Siberia.

One of the speakers at last night's meeting was loudly applauded when he

addressed the gathering as "comrades and fellow Bolsheviks." Winnipeg, May 2—That Ukrainian settlers in Springfield and adjacent districts of Manitoba are openly holding revolutionary meetings and planning an uprising this spring with the intention to establish a Bolshevik government, and that the priests of foreign churches are deliberately preaching sedition from their pulpits with the intent to inflame the foreign population against established government, was asserted today by D. A. Ross, M. L. A. for St. Clements.

EXCHANGE PRISONERS WITH BOLSHEVISTS

London, May 2—The British government announces that the Bolshevik government has made a proposal to exchange the members of the British military mission to the Caucasus for certain Russian subjects now in the hands of the British government.

It also announced that negotiations are proceeding for the exchange of all British prisoners in the hands of the Bolsheviks.

Minority of Stockholders Appeal Boston, May 2—The Boston and Maine Railway minority stockholders protective association yesterday announced that it had taken to the supreme court an appeal from the recent order of the Massachusetts public commission approving the proposed plan for a reorganization of the railroad.

MEMORIAL TO CANADIAN M. P. KILLED IN THE WAR

Ottawa, May 2—A memorial in the new parliament building, to Col. G. H. Baker, the only member of the Canadian house to be killed in the war, was proposed to the senate yesterday by Senator Foster. He moved that Senators Bradbury, Casgrain, Pope and himself be appointed to confer with a committee charged with the construction of the new building, that within it may be erected a memorial suitable to the memory of the late Colonel George Harold Baker.

Senator Dandurand heartily concurred in the proposal and suggested the committee might consider the advisability of adding to the memorial the names of members sons who sacrificed their lives in this war. The motion was adopted.

MONTREAL AGAINST THE ONE BIG UNION PLAN

Montreal, May 1—The "one big union" plan had its answer last night. From Montreal workmen when the delegates of the trades and labor council with only four dissenting voices, went on record as opposing it.

Yellow-bodied taxicabs, distance meters, uniformed drivers "everything, may soon be seen darting around the streets of the Canadian Capital.

VANCOUVER WOMAN'S PLEA FOR WORK FOR THE SOLDIERS

Vancouver B. C., May 2—An eloquent appeal for work for the soldiers was made before the Mothers Royal Commission yesterday by Mrs. Walter Crossfield.

"Our boys are walking the streets without work," she said, "many are living on their gratuities, and when these expire there is going to be something on your hands which you cannot handle."

She denounced profiteering and high food prices and urged immediate action to secure relief and work. The commission left last night for Calgary.

COMING DRY TIME GAVE INLAND REVENUE BOOST

Montreal, May 2—Inland revenue receipts in Montreal for the month of April amounted to \$2,675,985, showing an increase of \$1,321,233 as compared with the same month last year. The substantial increase is attributed by J. A. Bernier, district inspector, to the great activity of the last month in the purchase of spirituous liquors, as huge stocks were removed from bonded warehouses to meet the trade demands.

EXPORT MATTER ARRANGED

Ottawa, May 2—The impasse which has been reached in the exportation of Canadian produce, particularly of wheat and grain, through United States ports to the northern European neutrals has been satisfactorily overcome. The Canadian trade commission here placed the matter before the Canadian war mission in Washington, by whom representations were made with the result that the United States decided to grant permits for export to these northern neutrals on submission of particulars of cases in which shipments cannot be made through Canadian ports.

The arrangement, however, will apply only to shipments due to leave immediately, as the transportation department of the grain corporation at New York can give no assurance as to sailings a month in advance. The trade commission is taking up further the matter of intrastit shipments.
