FAMOUS LIGHTHOUSES.

The first lighthouse of which there is any record was built by Ptolemy on the island of Pharos, at the entrance to the harbor of Alexandria, Egypt.

Probably the most famous lighthouse of modern times is the Eddystone, which was one of the first built in England, and which has been famous because of its dangerous situation and its having been four times destroyed by the angry waters of the North Sea.

Minot's Ledge Light, at the entrance to Boston harbor, is among the latest of the American lighthouses, and shares with Old Boston Light the interest of every voyager who enters the tortuous channel to the city of the North.

OTTAWA DATED CAVS

The Knights of Columbus army hurtled through the city in a campaign in Ottawa, says the *Journal*. The campaign was a successful finish on the part of the knights, when it was announced that the objective—\$30,000—was passed by a substantial sum. With incomplete returns, the treasurer, T. Brown, announced a total of \$81,000 collected. In addition to this, there are approximately \$2,000 in subscriptions reported, but which have not yet been turned in at campaign headquarters, and \$10,000 in contributions outside the city to be heard from.

Most gratifying reports have been received at campaign headquarters from other cities. The knights are doing well so. That the half-million dollars which the Knights of Columbus set out to raise throughout Canada will be secured is a foregone conclusion. The objective was \$25,000. This was nearly doubled the sum raised in that city being \$48,000. In the city of Quebec the objective was \$50,000 and the amount raised was \$56,000.

CARDINAL FARLEY

(New York Times' Editorial.)

In that moving and splendid service at St. Patrick's Cathedral one winter day half a dozen years ago, of installation of Cardinal Farley, then lately welcomed home from Rome by a great popular demonstration of respect and affection, as Cardinal Archbishop of the Province of New York, one remembers best today in all that noble ceremony that shield over the altar with the legend, "Ecce Sacerdos Magnus."

Cardinal Farley was a great priest

who never forgot the difficulties and labors of the parish priest which he had to undergo in his early years. His education, of charity, of social and civic betterment, what duty to the church and to his people did he not perform? On the other day he was writing of Cardinal McCloskey what was true of all the great prelates of the Church: Cardinal McCloskey's character," wrote Cardinal Farley, long his secretary, who was a close friend of the Cardinal. "He was a man of great personal simplicity of manner, his dislike for public display and his careful avoidance of everything that might bring reflection upon the Church." Two or three years ago we might have seen him at the annual meetings, the achievements of Cardinal Farley, the Catholic Encyclopedia, of which he was the editor, and the great monument, perhaps his most enduring monument. The war has shown him as a resolute and able leader of his people in the defense of the land of our political allegiances. "Idea," he was fighting up to the very end, "the fight for a free and free people, which guarantee to all nationalities and small, peaceful possession of its territory, unhampered development of its resources, and the free competition of its industries in industrial and commercial competition. . . . God of battles, help us to win the right to free freedom, and peace!" We remember the message to the Catholic Congress, in the name of the Pope, in behalf of the Catholics of New York, in protest against the Good Friday massacre, the message of the long-range gun, "Men, God bids the brave to fight," and men of the Allied armies in the splendid defense of liberty and justice, and the message, so long brought home to himself the wrath of the New York State Reformers.

And the Church, great priest, good man, great citizen, Cardinal Farley is honored and mourned.

JEALOUSY BELIEVED RESPONSIBLE FOR ITALIAN'S DEATH

Toronto, Sept. 25.—Jealousy over woman is said by the police to have led to the shooting of Gioia Della Salandra, an Italian, living at 111 Elm street at 6 o'clock this morning.

Salandra died in the hospital later in the day. The police are looking for Leonard Demeo, who is suspected of having committed the deed.
