TUESDAY, MAY TWENTY. Sir Melburne Tait, retired chief justice of the supreme court of Quebec, was born in Melbourne, Que., on May 20, 1842. He was for many years law partner of the late Sir John Abbott. He became chief justice in 1906.

The Hon. F. L. Beique, senator of the dominion, was born on May 20, 1845, at St. Mathias, Que. He is one of the leaders of the bar in Montreal in many of the public movements in that city. He was called to the senate in 1902.

The Hon. J. A. Ouimet, retired judge of the court of King's Bench, Quebec, is sixty-five years of age today, having been born in 1848, at Ste. Rose, P. Q. He was for several years speaker of the house of commons and later minister of public works.
