Lady Tilley received today the following telegram from The Canadian Red Cross Society, Toronto:

"Pollowing cable has been received today from Chief Commissioner overseas." In conjunction with Central Prisoners' Committee, food and clothing for fifty thousand prisoners have been sent to Holland; also today large supplies drugs, medical comforts, invalid foods. Supplies also being sent to Denmark and Switzerland. Any supplies still needed in Germany will be forwarded from these centres. Cummunications and authentic information most difficult.
