General Intelligence.
The Sioux War.
The report of Sitting Bull's death.
Omaha, July 20.—A message was
received this morning from the com-
manding officers at Fort Tetterman,
which says:—A private courier has
just arrived from the command in the
field who left on the night of the 17th.
The day previous a courier was start-
ed from the north and completely cover-
ed the ground. We had a fair pros-
pect for a good crop in the southern
part of the country, but in twenty
four hours our prospect was blighted.
They covered the ground completely.
They are eating every green thing—
wheat, oats, corn, potatoes, garden
truck, &c. Farmers are busy cutting
everything that will do to cut—oats
and wheat—but in this vicinity will
not get half, no, not a quarter crop.
They are depositing their eggs—
What is to become of the Lord only
knows.

(Herey, Noble County, Letter to Sauge).
They have nearly cleaned out every-
thing, and filled the ground full of
eggs. Mr. Umberston, a Scandinavian,
one of our most wealthy men in
town, was here this morning. He
says he has lost \$500 in grain since
last Sunday, and that he counted
twelve hoppers on four inches of
ground, all laying eggs. So you see
they are filling the ground like a sieve,
twenty times worse than ever known
before. We have lost \$1000 since
Sunday in small grain.
The people are losing all courage.
As I am writing I see two covered
wagons going along. A great
many are leaving, but some are sit-
ting like ourselves. We have good
buildings, quite a stock of cattle, and
situated so as it is quite impossible
to pull up and leave without sacrific-
ing a great deal. I think there are some
situated as we are who will stay and
try stock raising—go into raising
sheep. We cannot raise hogs, for we
cannot raise enough to feed them.

Imprisoned in a Mine.
(From the London Daily News).
In the colliery districts of Pendle-
bury and Clifton, on July 21, 22 and
23, an extraordinary accident hap-
pened at the Clifton Hall Colliery. Four
dismal and twenty men and boys
were employed in the underground
works of the pit, which is one of the
deepest in the district. The cause of
the accident was the collision of two
cages meeting midway down the shaft,
which cut off all communication with
the head workings, and 330 men and
boys were consequently imprisoned for
nearly four days. The men were set
to work to clear the shaft, and eventual-
ly one of them fell into the hole at
the bottom of the pit. It was not
until nine o'clock, however, on Satur-
day morning that communication
with the men below could be opened.
The men were kept in very fair or-
der by two experienced under-lookers
who happened to be below at the time
of the accident. They were quite un-
aware of the nature of the block in
the shaft, or of the means which were
being taken for their rescue. But the
assurance of safety was maintained by
the fact that the ventilation of the
pit continued perfect.
As many of the men were slenderly
provided with food, they became ra-

tionously hungry, and when in the
course of Saturday supplies of bread
and cheese were sent down into the
mine, a scene of an exciting descrip-
tion took place. The food was served
out to the men from the cabin win-
dow, but in their excitement and im-
patience the men broke into the cabin
and helped themselves.

The Grasshoppers' Raid.
(Jackson, Minn., Letter to Pioneer-Press and

The grasshoppers came here last
week—millions of them. They came
from the north and completely cover-
ed the ground. We had a fair pros-
pect for a good crop in the southern
part of the country, but in twenty
four hours our prospect was blighted.
They covered the ground completely.
They are eating every green thing—
wheat, oats, corn, potatoes, garden
truck, &c. Farmers are busy cutting
everything that will do to cut—oats
and wheat—but in this vicinity will
not get half, no, not a quarter crop.
They are depositing their eggs—
What is to become of the Lord only
knows.

thing, and filled the ground full of
eggs. Mr. Umberston, a Scandinavian,
one of our most wealthy men in
town, was here this morning. He
says he has lost \$500 in grain since
last Sunday, and that he counted
twelve hoppers on four inches of
ground, all laying eggs. So you see
they are filling the ground like a sieve,
twenty times worse than ever known
before. We have lost \$1000 since
Sunday in small grain.
The people are losing all courage.
As I am writing I see two covered
wagons going along. A great
many are leaving, but some are sit-
ting like ourselves. We have good
buildings, quite a stock of cattle, and
situated so as it is quite impossible
to pull up and leave without sacrific-
ing a great deal. I think there are some
situated as we are who will stay and
try stock raising—go into raising
sheep. We cannot raise hogs, for we
cannot raise enough to feed them.
