According to this showing, the number of persons killed in train accidents was 212 and injured 2,111.

All accidents of other kinds, including those sustained by employees while at work and by passengers in getting on or off cars, bringing the total number up to 813 killed and 9,959 injured.

During this period there were 1,220 collisions and 838 derailments, of which 221 collisions and 84 derailments affected passenger trains, resulting in 41 fatal accidents to passengers and 826 injured. The lamage to cars, engines and roadway by these accidents amounted to \$1,914,258.

THE FATAL LONDON FIRE

Jury Find the General Electric Com-pany Was Guilty of Gross Negligence,

London, July 29.-The inquest into the death of the victims of the Victoria street fire on June 9th, in which nine young girls were burned to death, was concluded to-day, after having occupied the attention of the press and public for several weeks and having subjected the London fire department to much un-favorable comment. The jury found that the General Electric Company was guilty of gross negligence and of evasion of the Factory Acts. Chief Wells's explanation that the fire department had not adequate equipment was characterized as unsatisfactory.
