LOCAL NEWS

Policeman Henry was called into James M. Pooley's house, 28 Paradise Row, last night to quell a disturbance.

A cuff button found by the police on Main street, awaits an owner at the North End station.

Fifteen dollars worth of clothing for \$4.45, or \$18 worth of clothing for \$9.85. That's the song of C. B. Pidgeon's great end of the season suit values.

Three boys, Thomas Doherty, Joseph O'Brien and John Travis have been reported for throwing stones at the door of John Green, Mill street, on the 18th. They are also charged with using profane and obscene language.

Andrew Irvine, an old offender, faced the magistrate in the police court this morning on charges of drunkenness and begging on Douglas Avenue. He pleaded guilty to the first offense and was fined \$5 or two months. Irvine was remanded on the vagrancy charge until further enquiries were made by the court.

The Governor Cobb left this morning with a large number of passengers for Boston and intermediate points. Many tourists are returning from vacation trips and prefer the shore route to the direct one, giving them a few hours in some of the seaport towns along the coast.

A horse attached to a delivery wagon of the Standard Dairy Co., slipped on the wet pavement on Main street opposite the Baptist Church and fell to the ground. The shafts of the wagon were smashed and the harness damaged, but the horse escaped unhurt. It was led away to be re-shod.

Argument over the suit money question in the Curry separation suit was heard by His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown in the District Court this morning. Judgment was reserved. C. N. Skinner, K. C. appeared for Dr. Curry, and M. G. Teed, K. C., and A. H. Hamilton, K. C., for Mrs. Curry.

The price of Manitoba flour dropped yesterday 40 cents a barrel. This, after the flour had reached the highest mark attained in years, is looked upon as a very sudden and substantial drop. The general expectation is that the price will change would probably take place until next month, when the fiscal year of the Manitoba milling companies closes.

While making preparations for breakfast, Mrs. Annie Cox, 10 King street, West End, took a dizzy turn this morning and fell from the top of a stairs, rendering her unconscious and injuring her spine and side. Dr. Day was called and administered restoratives which soon brought back consciousness. Mrs. Cox will be laid up for some time.

Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Crossman, of Prince Edward Island, passed through the city today on their return from the States, where they had taken their nineteen year old son, who has suffered from mental trouble from infancy, for treatment. The young man has been in a sanitarium in Brockton, Mass., but as his condition shows no signs of improvement his parents decided to bring him back.

Alert White, who was formerly prominent in local baseball circles, reached the city today from Montreal, where he has resided for the past several years. Mr. White says that he has not been in the game this year as he finds he cannot spare the time from his business. He was met by his wife, who has been visiting relatives in the city.

The wedding of Miss Grace Chandler Emery, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. C. J. Emery, Biddeford, Me., and Dr. Fred B. Wheaton, of West Somerville, Mass., occurred at the home of the bride, 319 Main street, Monday, and was attended by relatives and a few friends. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Herbert F. Moulton, of the First Universalist church. They left on the afternoon train for New Brunswick. Both the bride and the groom were graduated from Tufts dental college this year, receiving their degrees.

THE LATEST VICTIM

Missed \$19 While on Board the Calvin Austin—Same Thief Supposed to be Still at Work.

Preston Ingersoll, a young man employed on the Calvin Austin, which sailed for Boston last evening, is mourning the loss of nineteen dollars. The youth missed the money in the dining hall and others on the steamer declare the amount was stolen. Mr. Ingersoll had lately received a portion of his wages from the company and cannot see how he could have mislaid the bills.

In view of the large number of cases of theft which have been taking place on the steamer among the passengers, it would seem the rogues have extended their operations to the employees of the boat. The latter have not been fully on their guard. However, if other losses of the same kind are reported, it is probable that the thief will not long be at liberty.

HOPE TO FINISH REPAIRS TO PIPE BEFORE WINTER

Forty Men Now at Work on Concrete Section of Loch Lomond Water System and Rapid Progress is Being Made

The repairs to the concrete section of the Loch Lomond extension of the water system are progressing very favorably. During the haying season a number of the workmen left to attend to their agricultural interests, but most of them have returned and there are now about forty men at work. The repairs to the eastern section which stretch over a length of about 1,800 feet have been almost completed and it is expected that a start will be made before long on the other end of the pipe. The work at that end will cover a stretch of almost the same distance and there is a lot of work ahead of the water department before the section will be in satisfactory condition. From the progress that has been made, however, it is hoped that the work will all be completed this fall, which is more than was expected when the repairs were commenced.

BOSTON EXPRESS DELAYED BY SLIGHT ACCIDENT

The Boston express which left here at 6:45 this morning met with a slight accident near Weirfield which delayed her for over an hour. A grate bar in the locomotive broke and it was necessary to stop the fire before repairs could be made. By the time the damage had been made good and the fire put in again over an hour had elapsed. Ambassador Bryce who was travelling on the train was among those delayed.

Owing to the track being blocked the Fredericton train did not reach the city until 10:15.

EQUITY COURT

An interesting case will likely be commenced in the Equity Court before His Honor Chief Justice Barker this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The case is that of Roydon et al vs. Giran et al. The plaintiffs reside in Boston, and the defendants, of whom there are a large number, reside in this province. This is a suit brought by the plaintiffs to compel the defendants to place in escrow in the Royal Bank, London, about \$9,000 shares of the Empire Coal and Tramway Co. stock and a lease and deed of the Jubilee Coal mine in Maroon, Cumberland Co., N. S. The plaintiffs also call upon the defendants to account for \$22,000 paid therefor on account of the purchase money of the mine and the output of the coal of the mine and the sale of such coal, or to repay the plaintiffs the money advanced by them on account of purchase money and development, with interest.

If this case is not adjourned or settled it will likely occupy several days. Dr. L. A. Curry, K. C., will appear for the plaintiffs, and H. A. Powell, K. C., and W. B. Chandler, K. C., for the defendants.

In the Equity Court this morning, C. S. Hanington moved in the matter of Lily R. Hutchinson, a Petitioner, for a reference to pass the accounts, same granted.

Argument was presented by counsel in the matter of the interpretation of the will of the late Rev. John A. Clark. At the conclusion his honor reserved judgment.

Dr. A. O. Esler, K. C., and James A. Belyea, K., appeared for the plaintiff, Jean Spurr Clark; J. MacMillan, Esq., appeared for the executor of the last will of Rev. John A. Clark; D. Mullis, K. C., and J. A. Barry for Percy S. Clark defendants.
