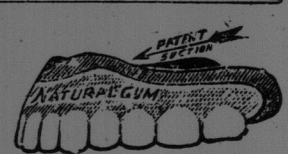

## WOMAN POISONED HIM, WRITES DYING MAN

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Jan. 12.—W. H. Helman, who died to-day in a hotel, left a letter saying that poison had been given him in Chicago yesterday by a woman with whom he came to Terre Haute on a train last night.

Helman's letter said that the woman had continued on her way to New Orleans.

He explained that she had come to him during the holidays and had poisoned him in his jewelry store. She left with jewelry worth \$500, he said, and he followed her to Chicago, where she promised he said, to give the jewelry to him if he would return with her to Terre Haute.

They went to a Chicago restaurant before taking a train last evening.

Helman wrote that the woman had poisoned him there. The letter does not explain why he left her on the train or whether he became ill before he reached his room at the hotel. It ends as follows:—

"She tried to poison me in a restaurant. I caught her trying to put something into my coffee, but she said that she was just going to put the sugar in for me. Coming down in the train she stole between \$75 and \$85 from me, and when she found out that I missed it, she admitted that she had it and said that she would give it to me when we got to Terre Haute."

"She is a 'white-slave' woman and has worked in Memphis and other towns up and down the Mississippi River getting hold of young girls, telling them she has jobs for them which will pay from \$10 to \$25 a day."
